

The Wise and the Foolish: A Bible Study

As the end of the year looms, many people have questions. What is in store for the next year? Will there be suffering, perhaps even greater suffering than I have already experienced? Will there be enough? How can I prepare for the uncertainty, the inevitable? When the year in review (or in the rearview) is one like 2020 (world-wide viral pandemics, racial and societal unrest, vicious outbreaks of anarchy, rancorous political squabbles, massive social construct reformations, insecurity about the future family structure) one may question, "Is this all there is to life? Or, how do I live as one who is wise among so much foolishness?"

In Matthew 25:1-13 (commonly known as "The Parable of the Ten Bridesmaids"), Jesus speaks of the reign and rule of the Messiah as a Bridegroom coming to seek His bride at a wedding feast. To mark the occasion with the proper pomp and circumstance due to the importance of this grand event, the Church (represented by the ten virgins) waits to join in the joyous royal procession and celebrate the wedding feast. But what happens when the Bridegroom is delayed? How is the Church to respond? How do you respond when faced with struggles or pitfalls that challenge the way you would have your life lived or ordered? What delays the joy you look forward to experiencing in this life, or in the life to come? What can we learn from Jesus' parable? Are there applications that can be made to our own lives which are so precious in the sight of the Lord?

Read Matthew 25:1-13.

Verses 1 and 10 highlight the joy of both the invitation to the reign and rule of Christ as well as the entrance into the wedding feast of joy. The "wise virgins" follow inside and celebrate behind closed doors with the Bridegroom and the bride.

- What makes you "wise for salvation"? (2 Timothy 3:14-17; John 17:9-22; James 1:16-21)
- From where does joy in salvation emanate? (Isaiah 12:1-6; Hebrews 2)
- In what ways do the Scriptures point you to experience the joy of your baptism? (Titus 3:1-8; Romans 6:1-11)
- How can you celebrate the assurance of your salvation now? (Philippians 1:21-26; Hebrews 6:9-12)
- What joy still awaits in an eternity with Christ and all the saints in heaven? (Isaiah 65:17-25; Revelation 21:1-7)

Verses 5-6 indicate, for whatever reason, a delay in the Bridegroom's arrival to the wedding. Both the "wise" and "unwise" suffer from the same delay.

- What insights can you glean about how to live your life in the between time—the time from Christ's first appearance in humility to die on the cross for our salvation and the time when He will appear again in glory on the Last Day of Judgment? (2 Peter 3:1-15; 2 Thessalonians 3:10-13; Revelation 2:1-7)
- How are "wise" Christians to prepare for the hardships that are expected in this life? (1 Peter 4:12-19; Romans 8:18-23)
- What tools are available to a Christian to aid their life of suffering? (Psalm 34:5-22; Ezekiel 18:19-28; Romans 5:1-5; Galatians 5:16-26)
- When Christians face extended periods of adversity or struggle, what gives them hope? (Psalm 9; Psalm 46; Ezekiel 37:1-14; 2 Corinthians 1:1-7; 2 Timothy 2:8-15)
- What vulnerable classes of individuals could use extra prayer and support as they face the challenges of everyday living? (Zechariah 7:8-12; Isaiah 61; Exodus 22:20-27; Luke 10:25-37)

After reviewing these Bible verses, consider the various life issues that face individuals in your home, your church, your community, your nation, and the world. What vulnerable individuals or classes of people has the Lord brought to mind to whom you may bring aid, support, prayer, and the Gospel of forgiveness in Jesus Christ alone?

Consider Rev. Dr. Jeff Gibbs's comments in his Matthew commentary on the "oil" of Matthew 25:1-13: "… the oil in the parable represents whatever it takes for you to be ready to honor the Bridegroom when he comes again in glory."

- How could repentance be a valuable oil for the life of wise Christians preparing to welcome the return of the Bridegroom in joy? (Psalm 32, 51; 1 John 1:5-10; Ezekiel 18:26-32; Luke 5:30-32)
- What other gifts of God in spiritual and physical support could be oil for the wise Christian? Consider ...

Denying myself (Proverbs 30:5-15; Matthew 16:21-28; 2 Timothy 2:8-13)

Sorrow over world's brokenness (John 16:18-28; 1 John 2:14-20; James 4:1-6)

Longing for the name of the Lord to be hallowed (Matthew 6:6-13; Psalm 34:1-9; Philippians 2:5-11)

As a Lutheran For Life, what message do you share to "build up the oil" of those suffering want, distress, or the brokenness of their own sinful condition? (Galatians 6:1-10; 2 Timothy 4:1-5; Romans 12; 1 Peter 3:12-22)

When faced with the culture of death and the unpreparedness of the "unwise," how can you speak the truth in love while using a Gospel-motivated voice For Life to bring Good News into their broken and shattered worldview?

What are ways you and/or your Life Team/Life Chapter could bring a message of hope and a Gospel-motivated voice for life to comfort or encourage those caught in the web of "unwise" actions that only lead to death?

- Organize an event, bring in a speaker from LFL, support through fundraising
- Other ideas you develop



Lutherans For Life 2021 Non-Federation States Essay Contest

Sponsored by the Council of Federation Presidents

For students in Grades 6 through 12

Any Lutheran student in a Lutheran school or church is eligible. Lutheran students may also enter through a home school or congregation (e.g. confirmation class, youth group) when validated by a pastor or teacher.

Contest Guidelines

Students will write a life-affirming essay based on the theme: **God Chose You** with the Bible verse: "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit". (John 15:16)

- 1. Not incorporating the theme and verse in the essay will disqualify the entry.
- 2. Examples of topics the essay could deal with are, but not limited to: abortion, the handicapped, adoption or foster care, infanticide, cloning, stem cell research, physician-assisted suicide, or euthanasia, etc.
- 3. Essays should include student's name, grade (identify school or church), and email address. All entries submitted by a teacher or pastor should include their name and email address. This information should be submitted on the rubric page used in grading the essay.
- 4. All sources for references, statistics, and quotes should be incorporated within the essay and then included in a bibliography at the end.

Grades 6 - 8 should submit essays up to 400 words Grades 9 - 12 should submit essays up to 750 words

Entries should be submitted digitally using Microsoft Word or Google Docs to jduncan@lutheransforlife.org by April 1, 2021.

- 5. There will be a \$100 first place-award and \$50 second-place award for each of the two. The two first-place category winners will advance to the national contest. Email jduncan@lutheransforlife.org with any questions.
- 6. Grand Prize for the national winning entry at each level: \$250 plus free conference registration to a 2021 Regional Conference and one night stay at the conference hotel.
- 7. All entries become the property of Lutherans For Life.

Celebrating Life Chapters and Life Teams

You are not alone.

Did you know the Lutherans For Life community numbers in the tens of thousands? Pastors, congregations, individuals, and communities stand beside you and speak together as Gospelmotivated voices For Life. And boy, do they know how to show the sanctity of life.

Let's celebrate with our Life Chapters and Life Teams. We have well over one hundred of these volunteer communities in our nationwide network. As you know, every year we ask them to report on their undertakings and obstacles so we can affirm and assist them. Here are some of their energizing stories:

Arizona: "In early February, our first adoption event was hosted with a baby shower to benefit first-time mom, Michelle, adopting her four-year-old from Ethiopia on February 8. Shower gifts included clothing, books, and games, along with generous cash donations to help with the little one's preschool tuition at our school!"

Illinois: "Our youth group has given us opportunities to work together. We assembled moms' care packages in April. The youth group leaders made a plan to assemble fifty packages including diapers, a blanket, a onesie, a bib, and a Christian book about development in the womb, all tied together as a gift. They delivered them to two local support centers. We also have our schoolchildren donating funds for the packages, and our group of friends has knitted baby blankets and hats. The diapers were collected on Life Sunday—12,620 diapers and 472 packages of wipes. On Mother's Day, we hand out baby bottles to congregation members to collect coins for the local pregnancy center and return them on Father's Day. Last year we collected almost \$3,000!"

Missouri: "We hosted a Christmas 'Parents' Day Out' event. It was so exciting and well received by parents. On a Saturday morning in December, parents dropped their children off for a morning of cookie decorating, crafts, storytime, the *Charlie Brown Christmas* cartoon, and pizza. We had 23 kids, but we also got other members of the congregation involved to help us out. Toward the end it was blissful chaos, and we plan to make it an annual activity!"

South Dakota: "Our chapter has a grant that we offer to couples who are adopting. We had our first family take advantage of the grant. In the months since we have been able to meet the baby. AWESOME! Our group also assisted the local Right To Life chapter in hosting the state Right To Life convention in September—it was a full year of planning. We came together as a team, and each did what they were good at. (Luckily, we all have different talents!)"

Michigan: "For several years, our congregation's LFL has offered to take pictures of people with their dads on Father's Day. Two members with photography experience were available before and after services with Polaroid cameras in an out-of-the-way hall near the church entrance. Last year a family of five declined and walked out of the church. After a while they returned, having changed their mind, and requested a photo. They explained they have pictures of the children, but none of the whole family. Not only did they pose for their picture, but they went back into the narthex and visited with others. Several months later they joined the church. Their acceptance is a happy ministry memory!"

Indiana: "One of our officers has become deeply involved the past few years in working with other Right To Life groups. She has gotten the other LFL officers to commit to praying at Planned Parenthood a couple of hours a month. Training for sidewalk counseling was offered, and a few came. Then a couple decided not to abort but to keep their baby. A shower was given, and the couple has attended a few Respect Life monthly gatherings. (Respect Life is now having several pro-life church groups meet together.)"

California: "Our main emphasis has been fund-raisers for pro-life clinics—a total of \$930 for the five area facilities! Another event that began in autumn of last year and continued into this year's 'pandemic shutdown' was our diaper drive; it was a success at the time, with stores of diapers in reserve at Support Circle in San Francisco. But just last week we were sent an e-mail with pictures of people (parents) receiving the diaper packages at their front door to use in their needy quarantine! (Toilet paper wasn't the only item being hoarded!)"

Kim Nessa, your Accountant, in addition to cutting all the checks and paying all the bills (your Lutherans For Life national organization has no debt!), assisted our annual auditor in documenting, reviewing, and reconciling all of our financial records and practices (no concerns identified!) and compiled our (thorough!) Statement of Functional Expenses for IRS purposes.

Katie Friedrich, your Office Assistant, has been adding up, typing in, and passing along the details of the more than 4,775 separate gifts we have received so far this year from generous folks just like you. (She also keeps our entire national staff cheerful with a priceless supply of smiles and hugs.)

Rev. Scott Licht, your Executive Director of Finance and Operations, has been implementing technology upgrades that have not only maintained but improved our ministry in this time of travel restrictions, enabling us to work together better (through videoconferencing and project management software) and engage more hearts and minds (with simpler, brighter, more dynamic, mobile-ready websites and live-streaming of our regional conferences). He's also compiling our conscientious budget proposal of more than \$1 million for the October Board of Directors meeting (and pastoring a mission congregation!).

Virginia Flo, your Conferences Director and Minnesota Regional Director, has been coordinating locations, catering, presenters, publicity, documents, agendas, and safety considerations (masked, sanitized, and socially distanced!) for our four regional conferences in Fargo (August), Pittsburgh (September), Phoenix (October), and Orlando (November).

Dr. Barb Geistfeld, your Texas Regional Director, has worked with a team of others to arrange our quarterly frontlines conference calls for regularly connecting and encouraging Life Chapters, Life Teams, State Federations, and other volunteers (she also really enjoys reaching out to our Texas donors, whose annual offerings exceed any other state, to communicate our gratitude).

Deaconess Chrissie Gillet, Psy.D., your Word of Hope Director, has fielded an increase in callers to our 24/7, toll-free, nationwide, and distinctively Lutheran post-abortion healing and crisis care hotline, and she's noting that in this time of widespread unrest, the conversations have concerned general anxiety, depression, and abuse, as well as abortion grief and guilt.

Michelle Bauman, your Y4Life Director, has been hosting a series of Thursday-night Chats 4 Life for our young people, facilitating timely discussions about healthcare rationing, racism, contraception, vaccines, gender dysphoria, suicide, and abortion with more than fifty participants. (She's also spearheading our exciting new initiative, Life Week 2021. Stay tuned for upcoming announcements about those activities!)

Rev. Jeff Duncan, your Mission and Ministry Director, has organized our new For Life Live events, featuring educational presentations and expert conversations twice a month on Tuesday evenings—like our national conferences but year-round and no-cost, open to the public thanks to the magic of the internet. (Some have been so popular that we've had to make waiting lists!)

Jan Nessa, your Office Clerk, has been answering your phone calls, responding to your e-mail inquiries, managing our mail, keeping our files, and otherwise learning to operate as a jill-of-all-trades (and master of most after only three months on staff!) linking all the moving parts of our team and ministry together.

And I've been producing Life Moments (multimedia versions of our Life Thoughts in the Church Year), Life Matters (short videos about life issue concepts and events for social media sharing), and Life-Minded (a podcast or twenty-minute audio program listeners can access anytime). I believe you'll agree that God has given us a team of competent, exemplary, professional, passionate, Gospel-motivated voices For Life! And thank you so much for your fellowship, encouragement, and support—you're making it all possible.

LAMBs – Lutherans Assembling Mercy Blankets

Although our world might tell us otherwise, children are truly a blessing. Lutherans For Life would like to celebrate children—especially those families with a lot of them! Through the skillfulness of some LFLers in Ohio and elsewhere, along with the Miami Valley Life Chapter, a project called "LAMBs" (Lutherans Assembling Mercy Blankets) was established.

We want students to be motivated by what God has done as our Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier that gives value to life. We want students to value themselves and to value others as persons because of this God-given value.



Where did Owen's Mission come from? From a very small and special baby named Owen. Rev. Dr. James I. Lamb, former executive director of Lutherans For Life, shares his story:

"I held my little grandson Owen in the palm of my hand. He died at 21 weeks during prenatal surgery to remove a large tumor. The nurse brought him to our son as we waited in the recovery room for Owen's mother. I find it difficult to describe what I felt when I was able to hold him. I had held the 20-week *Touch of Life* fetal model in my hands hundreds of times in front of students from preschoolers to seminarians. Holding Owen revived in me the reality behind those models. I will never hold them in the same way again."

As Owen's grandpa, Dr. Lamb wanted to do something special to remember Owen, honor Jesus, and help others understand the value God gives to even the smallest of lives. With the help of Owen's family, *Owen's Mission* was born. We are training facilitators to present these fetal model sets along with a DVD message from Dr. Lamb.

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The Basics of Lutherans For Life

Our Mission: Equipping Lutherans to be Gospelmotivated voices For Life

Our Vision: Every Lutheran congregation upholding the God-given value of human life and influencing society to do the same

Structure and Relationships

A local Life Chapter is a local organization that has been chartered by National Lutherans For Life. The Life Chapter is formally associated with and subject to, but not a part of, the corporation known as Lutherans For Life, Inc.

A State Federation is an organization that has been chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc., in a state where there are at least five chartered Life Chapters. In a state where a State Federation exists, the Life Chapters also become affiliated with the State Federation. This occurs automatically at the same time a Life Chapter becomes chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc. These relationships are basically the same whether or not the Life Chapter is incorporated. Thus, Lutherans For Life consists of a network of individual entities formally associated with each other.

Membership Information

All officers of State Federations and Life Chapters and Life Ministry Coordinators must be members in good standing of Lutheran congregations and members of National Lutherans For Life.

Membership contributions are divided among the national organization, State Federation, and local Life Chapter if it is chartered.

Life Chapters that wish to include a membership form in newsletters or correspondence are asked to maintain the form and information provided by the national office. The local Life Chapter may not establish its own membership program since LFL has a "unified membership" program. When sending a membership form to the national office, make sure the Life Chapter name and number, if chartered, is written on the form in the space provided. This will ensure that the State Federation and local Life Chapter receive the proper remittance payment.

Membership Classifications

Annual Membership

 Annual members join by making a membership donation accompanied by a completed copy of the membership form (or by joining online).

Sponsor Membership

- Sponsor members pledge to contribute a certain amount each month and to pray regularly for Lutherans For Life.
- Sponsor members receive a monthly letter from the executive director.
- Sponsor members are asked to renew their monthly pledge each year as part of the annual membership drive.

The Remittance Program of LFL

All MEMBERSHIP donations are shared with the chartered State Federation and/or local Life Chapter to which the particular members may belong. The membership donations are divided as follows:

Annual Memberships:

- 20% goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 20% goes to the State Federation.)
- 20% goes to the State Federation
- 60% remains at national

Sponsor Memberships:

- 1/12 goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 1/12 goes to the State Federation.)
- 1/12 goes to the State Federation
- 10/12 remains at national






