



## Bible Study: The Science and the Scriptures



Christianity arises from facts. The Gospel relies on events. Other religions depend on conventional sentiments or platitudes. Our doctrines and beliefs derive from public evidence rather than private revelations. Science and faith, explained accurately, don't oppose each other. Science stands firmly on the faith's side.

This also applies to our assertions about the worth and purpose of all human persons. Opinions, however widespread, do not qualify anyone for membership in the human race. And emotions, no matter how powerful, cannot disqualify anyone from it. Objective criteria define alive or lifeless, and policies or verdicts won't change that. So, we need not hesitate to speak the truth about the sanctity of life, and we don't have to apologize for it. We proclaim it with courage, confirmed by realities, and we put it into practice with compassion, because truth gives love shape (1 Corinthians 13:6) and love gives truth direction (1 John 3:18).

- 1. Look at Hebrews 3:4, Psalm 19:1, and Romans 1:20. What good reasons do we have for believing God creates every human life?
- 2. What do these actions tell us about His disposition toward us? Consult Proverbs 3:19, Psalm 90:2, Psalm 62:11-12, James 1:17, and Jeremiah 23:23-24 for indications.
- 3. And what do they tell us about ourselves in 1 Corinthians 4:7; Romans 7:18-19, 24; and John 15:5?
- 4. Read Luke 2:1-5; Matthew 13:55; John 18:20; John 14:11; Acts 2:22-23, 32; and Hebrews 2:14. What good reasons do we have for believing God redeems every human life?
- 5. What does this tell us about our difficulties? Refer to 2 Corinthians 4:7-12, 1 Corinthians 15:58, and Colossians 3:23-24.
- 6. What good reasons do Romans 5:18, John 12:32, and 2 Corinthians 5:14-15 highlight for our believing God calls every human life?
- 7. Turn to Ecclesiastes 8:8; Revelation 1:17-18; and John 10:17-18, 27-29. What does this data tell us about our life and death?
- 8. What joy and hope do these observations give us when the sanctity of life seems invisible? Find explanation in 1 Corinthians 1:26-31, Matthew 25:40, 1 Samuel 16:7, and 2 Corinthians 4:16-18.
- 9. And what comfort and encouragement do all these details bring when our message is rejected? Examine 1 Corinthians 1:18, 22-25; 1 John 4:4; John 15:18-19; and John 16:3.



## We Have a Better Savior

COVID-19 continues to cause great concern in 2021. Terminal diagnoses are still leaving loved ones afraid. Infertility is still leaving hearts feeling abandoned. Surprise pregnancies are still leaving consciences ashamed.

Embryos are still being executed in experiments. Unborn babies are still being scheduled for abortion. Children are still awaiting adoption. Mothers are still experiencing pressure to terminate. Fathers are still believing lies about it. Persons with disabilities are still hearing euthanasia praised. Senior citizens are still considering physician-assisted suicide. And a sense of general anxiety has only intensified it.

Yet the whole world needs—like never before—to remember and rejoice in the sanctity of life! Humankind needs to hear and see and feel and believe the Gospel—that Almighty God creates, redeems, and calls every human life as His own precious treasure, from fertilization to forever, for the sake of Jesus Christ the Savior.

Our mission at Lutherans For Life is to help equip you to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life—speaking with courage and compassion! This truth is still changing hearts! This love is still saving lives!

We also long for a world where age, appearance, and ability do not determine a person's worth. Where someone originates or resides ought not diminish their humanity. How pretty, productive, or popular we find them cannot detract from their dignity. Practices like abortion, assisted suicide, and embryo experimentation invite prejudice, discrimination, and injustice.

Even social ills such as poverty, inequality, illiteracy, bullying, abuse, addiction, and divorce only amount to symptoms. The real and root problem comes from the human sinfulness that renders us selfish. No government or public initiative can save us from ourselves, because both government and general public consist of nothing but ourselves.

We have a better Savior and a greater salvation. The Lord our God has incarnated and united Himself into our nature and flesh. Our Heavenly Father takes responsibility for all evils and makes restitution for all wrongs. His self-sacrificing love and devotion justify and reconcile each of us to Him and this whole realm of His. His presence among us relieves fears, and His promises heal from suffering. He preserves body and soul unto eternity and provides for every need. His forgiving grace brings infinite sanctity and fundamental significance to every member of our one human race and species.

I hear regularly from women and men who have participated in a past abortion. They lament that when they were considering abortion, no one from their church spoke to them either publicly or privately about its ethics and alternatives. These sisters and brothers desperately desired guidance, a Word from the Lord. They deeply needed direction, and from their Christian loved ones, none came. In the decades since, they've suffered alone. They have longed for their pastors and parishes to name abortion specifically a sin. They've hungered to hear the atonement and forgiveness of Jesus Christ proclaimed directly to it. And when they have finally encountered that courageous Law and compassionate Gospel, they rejoice. Far from offending them, these declarations provide precious relief and healing that sustains their trust in our Heavenly Father and their anticipation of everlasting life in His fellowship.

## Media Outreach: KFUO Radio and Lutherans For Life




Lutherans For Life has partnered with historic LCMS broadcast service Worldwide KFUO (kfuo. org).

## How to Receive Critical Feedback

The student didn't mince words on her evaluation of my talk: "Alan is homophobic." Two other feedback forms included the same sentiment. Another student wrote,

"Please avoid being so judgmental next time, and if you ever speak to teens again, tweak the presentation to apply to us. Stop talking about other people's sin ... this was a waste of time judging other Christians, which Jesus taught us not to do." That's harsh feedback. Should I ignore what they wrote? Retire early? What do you do when you receive critical feedback?

Even though only four out of 270 students gave negative feedback, I don't want to ignore what they wrote. It's possible I can learn something from their responses. I want to be a person who pursues truth, even if it's critical feedback about my ideas or the manner in which I communicate them. That requires humility, which isn't always easy to practice.

Here are three steps to take when you receive critical feedback.

First, realize you won't please everyone. If your expectations are too high, you'll be often disappointed. You can say the most truthful comment in the most gracious way, but someone will still get angry. I'm not claiming that what I said and how I said it was perfect, but I need to set realistic expectations. Some things you say will rile people up no matter how graciously and compassionately you say them. Your job is to ensure that you don't add unnecessary offense to what you say. Even Jesus' perfect responses weren't met with universal praise. Don't expect yours will be, either.

**Second, discern the truth from the error.** Sure, it's possible someone is simply angry with me and isn't being fair with their feedback. It's also possible there's validity to what they're saying. Being committed to the truth requires I investigate whether there's any legitimacy to what they're saying.

The early church was charged with a similar task: "Examine everything carefully; hold fast to that which is good; abstain from every form of evil" (1 Thessalonians 5:21–22). Many claims can contain truth and error. It's prudent to discern one from the other. "Do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God, because many false prophets have gone out into the world" (1 John 4:1). Not everything first-century believers heard was true. They had to discern whether something was from the Holy Spirit or the spirit of the antichrist (1 John 4:2–3). It was a critical distinction.

In the context of assessing feedback, our job is to discover whether there's any merit to the critique. In addition to my own honest introspection about my presentation, it's also valuable to solicit the candid feedback from another person to corroborate or contradict the student's assessment. When asked, others who were present during my presentations felt the charge of homophobia was unfounded. Besides, it's often unclear what is meant by "Alan is homophobic." It could just mean they disagreed with my claim that Scripture says homosexual sex is a sin. Using terms with the suffix "phobic" is often merely a form of name-calling and used as a substitute for a legitimate argument.

I also considered the charge that I was wrong to judge other Christians, especially since the student claimed that Jesus taught us not to judge. This claim, however, is obviously false. Not only did Jesus support judging people, He also taught His followers how to judge another believer (Matthew 18:15–



20). Even Jesus' oft-cited words "Do not judge" don't support the student's claim since Jesus follows up His statement with an explanation of how to properly judge a brother (Matthew 7:1–5).



Perhaps the feedback that had merit was the student's request for me to "tweak the presentation to apply to [teens]." Though I always adapt my content to fit my audience's demographic, it's possible I didn't do enough. To be honest, it's difficult to know what exactly is meant by the request, but I'm still taking the feedback to heart and honestly reviewing my presentation. I'll be teaching on the same content again in the next few weeks and will be looking for ways to adapt my material. Bottom line, I'm looking for any truth in critical feedback where I can improve what I'm saying or doing.

Third, stay faithful. It's tempting to be discouraged when people are critical. If I were to throw in the towel at the first negative comment, I would have given up a long time ago. Don't let the criticism paralyze you. You need to embrace feedback, make changes where necessary, and then press on. Your job is to be faithful to present the truth in a clear and gracious way and then leave the results up to God (1 Corinthians 3:6–7).



Our 2021 Theme: God Chose You







## Owen's Mission



Owen's Mission is a very special project of Lutherans For Life. The goal of this project is to honor Jesus

by presenting a set of *Touch of Life* fetal models to every Lutheran elementary and high school in the country. We want students to understand the God-given value of each life from the moment of conception. We want students to be motivated by what God has done as our Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier that gives value to life. We want students to value themselves and to value others as persons because of this God-given value.



"I held my little grandson Owen in the palm of my hand. He died at 21 weeks during prenatal surgery to remove a large tumor. The nurse brought him to our son as we waited in the recovery room for Owen's mother. I find it difficult to describe what I felt when I was able to hold him. I had held the 20-week *Touch of Life* fetal model in my hands hundreds of times in front of students from preschoolers to seminarians. Holding Owen revived in me the reality behind those models. I will never hold them in the same way again."





As Owen's grandpa, Dr. Lamb wanted to do something special to remember Owen, honor Jesus, and help others understand the value God gives to even the smallest of lives. With the help of Owen's family, *Owen's Mission* was born. We are training facilitators to present these fetal model sets along with a DVD message from Dr. Lamb.

## Need a Speaker?

- Honorarium: Affiliated speakers for Lutherans For Life are not in a paid position. Therefore, we ask that sponsoring groups provide an honorarium for affiliated speakers. The sponsoring group determines the amount of the honorarium. Honorariums depend on number of events. Honorariums begin at \$200.
- Meals: \$25 per day unless other arrangements are made.
- Other: A lectern will be needed. A TV, video projector, DVD player, and screen may be needed.



## The Basics of Lutherans For Life

Our Mission: Equipping Lutherans to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life





#### Structure and Relationships

A local Life Chapter is a local organization that has been chartered by National Lutherans For Life. The Life Chapter is formally associated with and subject to, but not a part of, the corporation known as Lutherans For Life, Inc.

A State Federation is an organization that has been chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc., in a state where there are at least five chartered Life Chapters. In a state where a State Federation exists, the Life Chapters also become affiliated with the State Federation. This occurs automatically at the same time a Life Chapter becomes chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc. These relationships are basically the same whether or not the Life Chapter is incorporated. Thus, Lutherans For Life consists of a network of individual entities formally associated with each other.

#### Membership Information

All officers of State Federations and Life Chapters and Life Ministry Coordinators must be members in good standing of Lutheran congregations and members of National Lutherans For Life.

Membership contributions are divided among the national organization, State Federation, and local Life Chapter if it is chartered.

Life Chapters that wish to include a membership form in newsletters or correspondence are asked to maintain the form and information provided by the national office.

The local Life Chapter may not establish its own membership program since LFL has a "unified membership" program. When sending a membership form to the national office, make sure the Life Chapter name and number, if chartered, is written on the form in the space provided. This will ensure that the State Federation and local Life Chapter receive the proper remittance payment.

#### Membership Classifications

#### Annual Membership

• Annual members join by making a membership donation accompanied by a completed copy of the membership form (or by joining online).

#### Sponsor Membership

- Sponsor members pledge to contribute a certain amount each month and to pray regularly for Lutherans For Life.
- Sponsor members receive a monthly letter from the executive director.
- Sponsor members are asked to renew their monthly pledge each year as part of the annual membership drive.

#### The Remittance Program of LFL

All MEMBERSHIP donations are shared with the chartered State Federation and/or local Life Chapter to which the particular members may belong. The membership donations are divided as follows:

#### Annual Memberships:

- 20% goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 20% goes to the State Federation.)
- 20% goes to the State Federation
- 60% remains at national

#### Sponsor Memberships:

- 1/12 goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 1/12 goes to the State Federation.)
- 1/12 goes to the State Federation
- 10/12 remains at national


