Special Session #1 Still Here: Caring for a Post-Abortive Woman

Session 1 - Trinity Sanctuary

Christian passion for respecting and protecting unborn lives sometimes overlooks the other victims of abortion. God's grace extends also and especially to those grieving their own involvement in such a sin. Mother and father are still here, even if baby isn't anymore. How can we let them know we're still here, with them in their hurting, and that our Father and Savior is still here, for them and their healing? We'll investigate six needs these neighbors of ours have and outline six gifts of the Gospel we can offer them from Jesus Christ.

Special Session #2

This Is My Body: Christian Compassion and Courage Concerning Sexuality and Gender Sessions 2 – Trinity Sanctuary

Our culture is wrestling with questions about sexuality and gender. Many of our communities, congregations, and families are struggling with these issues as well. How do our bodies reflect and confess the grace of God? For what privileges and responsibilities has He made us male and female? How does He safeguard these gifts? How can we incorporate and care for individuals experiencing suffering and temptation related to sexuality and gender? How may we speak truth and show love in such sensitive situations? We will be motivated by the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We will examine instruction from Scripture, engage observations of science, and explore opportunities for servanthood.

Breakout #1: Rev. Steve Andrews, Jr. A Christian Use of the Internet and Social Media

Many are familiar with the 3 T's of Stewardship: time, talent, and treasure. Perhaps at this point, it's worth adding a 4th T to the mix: technology. We live in a time where we have computers in our pockets and everyone seems to be glued to their screens all day, every day. That's definitely not how the Lord made us, but must Christians reject these things altogether? Or might we be able to use technology to serve our neighbor? We'll begin by looking at



technology as a whole, and then zoom in on the subjects of the internet and social media. Pastor Andrews is the Associate Pastor at St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Lee's Summit, where he and his wife Hannah are parents to four adorable children: Talia (7), Eliana (5), Eden (3), & Chara (1).

Breakout #2: Rev. Dr. Tyler Arnold

Parenting with Prodigal Children

Join Pastor Arnold as he leads a study on Luke 15, especially the parable of the prodigal son. Participants will examine the son and his misdeeds; take a look at the father and his reaction; and consider the son who was lost, but ends up within the father's household.
