



# Bible Study: The Son Rises with the Light of Life



The Resurrection of Our Lord proclaims God's love for human life. The Heavenly Father will stop at nothing to rescue and preserve us from death. He delights to bring us His own abundant and everlasting being even in the midst of frailty and suffering. Every beat of a heart, every breath in the chest, every member of our race demonstrates once again how the Almighty Maker wills us here. Easter Jesus makes for the most life-affirming message and festival of all.

Jesus predicated that He would come back from the dead three days after He died. When He was crucified, His enemies were afraid that His disciples would steal His body. They placed a giant rock over His tomb, sealed it, and posted guards. On the morning of the third day, there was an earthquake and an angel opened the tomb. It was empty. The guards were so afraid, they passed out. The women who went to finish the burial preparations were also afraid. The angel told them Jesus had risen. Jesus appeared to them and instructed them to tell His disciples about it. The guards and Jesus' enemies pretended the disciples stole the body so they wouldn't get in trouble.

- 1. Read the Easter Gospel in Matthew 28:1-10. Why did these events take place at dawn on the first day of the week (Genesis 1:1-5; John 1:1-5)? How do God's creating, incarnating, and incorporating each highlight the sanctity of every human life?
- 2. What does it mean that the guards became like dead men? What does this tell us about playing with the power of death (Matthew 26:52; Daniel 3:22; Romans 5:12)?
- 3. How does the angel greet the women? What is significant about this greeting (Luke 1:30; Luke 5:8-10; 1 John 4:18)?
- 4. What makes it especially appropriate for the women to witness resurrection first (Genesis 3:15, 20; John 16:21?

5. Why does the angel remind them about the crucifixion (1 Corinthians 15:56; Hebrews 10:18; Isaiah 25:8; Matthew 9:6-7)?



- 6. How did the women feel about their experience? How were they able to be both at the same time? What does this tell us about Christian faith in general and life issues in particular?
- 7. What evidences does the story give that the resurrection really happened (see also Luke 24:39-42)? Why does it matter that the resurrection account be factual and literal (1 Corinthians 15:14-17)? What scientific evidences are there for the value of human life in the context of surprise pregnancy or terminal diagnosis?
- 8. What excuses did the chief priests give for the empty tomb (Matthew 28:11-15)? What are some popular justifications given for abortion and physician-assisted suicide? What really motivates these arguments and objections?
- 9. What did Jesus look like after He rose from the dead (John 20:14-16; Luke 24:15-16; Revelation 5:6)? What does this tell us about God's regard for human bodies, however weak or wounded they may appear? Why is this good news for us? How does it affect the way we treat our neighbor's body (and our own)?

# Are You Multifaceted?

Serving in the Lord's life arena as a Life Advocate, or as a Life Team or Life Chapter member, can be very rewarding and bear much fruit. But sometimes your efforts may become too narrow as you focus on *one* life issue—most often abortion. Lutherans For Life encourages all of our Frontline workers to be multifaceted!

What does this mean? Multifaceted, as defined by the Merriam Webster online dictionary, is "having many facets or aspects"—multiple parts making up the whole. Multifaceted, as it applies to life issues, means you are aware of and work with *many* life issues from fertilization to natural death—or as we like to say at LFL: From Fertilization to Forever!

Single-faceted ministries are the opposite of this and are less desirable. You will find greater success and impact in being multifaceted. As a worker in the life ministry of the Body of Christ, you will certainly need to address the horror of abortion, but you may find that people run the other way when you focus *only* on this issue. Somehow, you must be able to open hearts, minds, and ministries to the vast numbers of hurting people that have absolutely no personal association with abortion at all, but still need the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the hope, strength, and peace He can bring to their lives amid *their* life issues. And when you *do* deal with abortion, your heart must be compelled to act as Jesus would act by showing love and compassion to the mom, dad, grandparent, or other persons touched by this tragedy. If you do this, you are already expanding your vision and becoming multifaceted!

How can you equip your church and your community to recognize and care about a variety of life issues? Rest and trust in God. Pray. Become true friends with people in your congregation so you know what life issues they may face. Be aware of the needs in your community. Then research and explore ways to help people with a specific life issue. Involve your pastor(s). God truly cares about every human heart that hurts, and He will bless your efforts.

Know that *someone* needs to know the information you are providing on a specific life issue if you have researched local needs and have prayed about it! Life ministry is an ongoing process, and you should keep learning and keep developing your resources. Life issues continually evolve and change, so you should keep current with local laws and trends. Above all, come to Lutherans For Life! Our website, publications, and Volunteer Relations Team can inform and educate you about a vast multitude of life issues that affect all of us. We know this may seem daunting, but the Volunteer Relations Team is here to work with you!


You know the saying, "A picture is worth a thousand words." We hope the iceberg graphic in this article will raise your awareness of the multifaceted aspect of life issues. Not every congregation will deal with every life issue. Caution and care must be used when discussing certain sensitive life issues. We suggest you work closely with your pastor(s) and focus on one life issue at a time to maximize your efforts. Did we mention the Volunteer Relations Team is *always* here to help you?

As you minister to those around you, you know in your heart you are to meet people where they hurt. Your role model for ministering to the needs of others is Jesus. Matthew 25:37-40 says it all: "Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and



give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'"





# Ongoing Resources for Your Life Ministry

You may already be very familiar with the following resources, but one aspect of a thriving, successful ministry of any kind is the repetition of important information. Continual reminders of what is available and what have proven to be effective tools will help you succeed in your life ministry.

Life Quotes is a great way to provide regular quotes on life issues. They are just a few short sentences and easily fit into your weekly church bulletin or newsletter. People can read them in a few seconds, and they are impactful. They are dated but may be used at any time. If you use these unique quotes weekly, you might also consider including a standard message for those in need of spiritual guidance due to having had an abortion, for example. Here's what a message could look like:

Life Thoughts are statements based on the Three-Year or One-Year Lectionary from Lutheran Service Book. They explain the weekly Scripture readings from the perspective of the sanctity of human life. Regularly put these in your bulletin or newsletter, and people will start looking for them.

- Life Notes is a weekly e-news digest containing the latest LFL news. You will receive notice of upcoming events and quick links to LFL programs and commentaries. Life Notes is filled with information you won't want to miss! It will become a regular resource tool for valuable information you can use in your communication efforts. To sign up, go to lutheransforlife.org and click the small purple box in the upper righthand corner of the home page.
- Frontline Teleconference Calls are regularly conducted on the second Monday of each quarter (January - April - July - October). Please join this Zoom call and learn about projects LFL is sponsoring or learn about activities being done by Life Teams, Life Chapters, and Life Advocates that you can use in your church! Check the LFL website calendar for the Frontline Teleconference Call details.

So, if you find us reminding you about *Life Quotes, Life Thoughts, LifeDate, Directions, Life Notes,* and much, much more it's because those useful tools are what is needed in our churches every week. You will find them under the Resource tab on our website. Use them as they are always up to date and provide inspiration as the messages contained within these resources are meaningful and will bring God's love for life as people read and digest them. It might be a simple approach to life ministry, but it will work. Some churches have set up their church administrators with the links to these sites, and they are the ones who download the information weekly for the church's bulletins, newsletters, Facebook page, and other forms of communication. Find out from your pastor if that is something you can speak with your church administrators about and then take the time and work with them. This can become an easy task. If that idea doesn't work, it's simple to just copy and paste the *Life Quotes* and *Life Thoughts* into an email and forward to your church offices weekly. Pick an article from *Directions, LifeDate*, or other LFL resources and provide it to your church for reproduction in their publications. You will feel like you have conquered a huge task in doing so, and your pastor will appreciate your effort. Of course, as in all cases, speak with your pastor first before filling up the church inbox with this information.



# Using Life Week 2023 in May/June




For the last three years, the staff at Lutherans For Life has produced wonderful Life Week materials that speak of the value and sanctity of human life. And, for the last three years, we have encouraged all our Life Teams and Life Chapters to use these materials throughout the year! Now in 2023, we expand our focus with Life Advocates who might be in any church sharing life issue information to equip your neighbors in the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the value of all life. But what should that look like? Here is a suggested pattern that you could use for May/June 2023 in your church(es).

- 1. Go to the Life Week 2023 archive of all our materials: lutheransforlife.org/life-week-2023.
- 2. Scroll down and use materials found under Life Week 2023 Day 1—Sunday Blessed as a Gift (Gospel-motivation). Please note, while these materials say "Day 1" and were used to kick off our 2023 Life Week celebration in January, they can be used anytime throughout the year. Don't get caught in the "Day 1" trap! Use any day's materials now and later as you see fit.
- 3. Use the devotion, fact sheets, and activity sheets to inspire and encourage support of life issues in your church, your Life Teams, and Life Chapters. We've included examples of each that you can download and reprint. Use one set in May and one set in June. Insert these into newsletters, bulletins, or post on doors and bulletin boards throughout the church.
- 4. Ask your pastor to highlight these materials in a worship service. He might develop a sermon or teach a Bible class specific to these life issues. He might also pray specifically for families experiencing these issues or the groups and support organizations that help by providing aid and material goods for the benefit of others.
- 5. When sharing the facts about these life issues, read them aloud, then ask others what they have learned. Do they recognize the facts as true? Do these facts challenge and/or inspire anyone to action? In what ways could you pray for those experiencing the facts of these life issues? In what ways could you offer support or render aid to your neighbor in light of the facts they are experiencing?
- 6. Pick one or two activities and see how excited your church can be to accomplish a good work in support of these life issues. For example, the Blessed as a Gift activity page is focused on celebrating Creation and Identity. One of the activities suggests you can "Celebrate differences God gives in gender, culture, and age." Since Mother's Day and Father's Day are in May and June, celebrate appropriately the gift of each to the family and the Church. Write a story or share the stories of mothers making family life wonderful and fathers providing! Interview several age groups of mothers and fathers and compare the history of how God has continued to bless them even as the culture around them changes. Ask your pastor to bless in worship the gift of family in prayers. Be creative; try anything and ask for feedback from others at the end!
- 7. Open the meetings of guilds, elders, council, and other committees using the devotion for Day 1 Blessed as a Gift. Ask people to comment and challenge them to read scripture and come up with their own examples of how God blesses all His Church with our unique and beautiful creation and identity in Him as His baptized children. Use the devotion to challenge all groups



- to look for ways to acknowledge, thank, and serve those who struggle with identity or life issues.
- 8. Do research on what outside organizations or groups in your community support and encourage those experiencing life issues related to creation and identity. If you make a connection, invite these groups to speak at a Bible class or after church in a coffee fellowship. Invite them to your boards and councils to give brief presentations on the good they accomplish in the community and potential ways your church, Life Teams, and Life Chapters could be of material and financial aid in their efforts for the community! Be sure to clear invitations with your pastor(s) and recognize Law/Gospel dynamics and challenges of non-Lutheran groups. Make sure they also are aware of these distinctions as they address Lutheran audiences. They will understand, and together you can still support and encourage good works for your neighbor's benefit.



- 9. If you have more time, more people talent, and resource networking opportunities, go back to the Life Week 2023 archive and use the other materials from Day 1.
  - a. Preview and show the testimonial videos at meetings or in Bible class.
  - b. Watch the hour-long Day 1 Presentation with Rev. Michael Salemink, our executive director. Then discuss what you learned or where you might want to do more exploratory research to speak effectively in support and concern for this life issue.

These are some of our ideas. What ideas do you have that you want to try? We'd love to hear of them and what you might accomplish! Keep in mind, this is just a start. Next month and the next month you can do this all again for another life issue. As you share these simple "fact and activity sheets," you are equipping all those who read, mark, and inwardly digest their content to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life! You are equipping your friends, family, and fellow church goers to be life-giving and life-supporting voices of the Gospel of life and forgiveness in Jesus Christ, our risen Lord of Life.

# The Unborn



At 15 weeks of pregnancy, the unborn baby has developed every major organ and most are functional, she responds to touch and pain, she has a preference for sweet over bitter flavor, and she demonstrates right or left hand dominance.

### Devotion – Day 1 – Blessed as a Gift – Life Week 2023

Bible readings: Genesis 1: 1, 27, 31; Romans 6:23; 2 Corinthians 1:3-4, 8:9

You are a gift! You are a unique creation. As of November 2022, you are 1:8,000,000,000 (that is, one in eight billion people, the estimated population of the world). There has been no one like you since Adam and Eve. There will be no one like you, ever. Unique is an understatement! "Gift" is a blessing of God.

The ESV Study Bible says: "God made this world and all that is in it: 'In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth ... God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them' (Genesis 1:1, 27). He created human beings to be like Him and to have unhindered fellowship with Him, and when His work of creation was finished, He saw that it was 'very good' (Genesis 1:31)."

But you don't feel "very good"; you have limitations. You are not perfect. You are flawed, sinful. You want but are disappointed when not receiving. Called to live in family and friendship, you often live in isolation, exclusion, and separation. Others hurt you. Sometimes you return the same intentionally. You want a full life—no suffering. Some are disabled. Others do the disabling, especially as you incapacitate your neighbor through neglect, shame, and scorn. You serve others poorly but demand they serve you in perfection.

"For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9).

Christ emptied Himself for you! Though you are poor in spirit and afflicted, Christ became poorer for you. He endured your shame, your suffering, and your penalty of death on the cross in your place. In this you are redeemed—His poverty buys your richness. His death and His suffering of God's wrath buy your freedom. Your sin costs His life. His satisfaction freely restores your life. "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23).

This Gospel truth frames every message from Lutherans For Life. Your life's value and worth are beyond measure. Silver or gold cannot buy it. Christ's body and blood secure it. God Himself provided the Lamb. By His stripes you are healed.

Whatever days of trouble confound you, God turns to you with His favor and grace! The enemies—sin, death, and the power of the devil—cannot overcome you. In Christ, they are overcome! The Lord protects you. By faith you trust His loving care and providential support. By faith you live in His peace and joy even when, by sight, life often doesn't look "very good."

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our affliction, so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God" (2 Corinthians 1:3-4).

We live in a complicated and confusing world, one where sin abounds all around us. Christians who value the sanctity of all human life may experience times of frustration, maybe even despair. Will it ever turn out better? Are the actions and activities through which we are engaging the culture effective? Are we winning hearts and minds for life?

Times like this call for a reminder that faith triumphs. God has already won! He will not give us over to the will of our enemies (Psalm 41:2). God does consider the poor estate in which we live and congregate. He even delivers us in our own days of trouble (Psalm 41:1). As Lutherans For Life, we trust in the guidance of God's Word and the power of the Gospel to change hearts and minds, not our own actions. Death is not the solution to life problems. It might seem like a little thing, even an unimportant thing, but staying in God's Word and following His commands for our life matters. God declares, in Him, that we are "Blessed For Life" (Life Sunday 2023 Theme).

Scripture encourages and informs your walk of faith. Your efforts are important, even when they seem obscure or ineffective. There is great importance in staying the course, continuing the race, holding fast to your beliefs when all around you is shifting sand. That you may remain encouraged as you strive to serve others, recognizing that in Christ we are all 'Blessed For Life':

### Read Joshua 6.

 Describe what the young nation of Israel is facing. What is their challenge? Knowing their history, their unfaithfulness to listening and doing that which God commands, what difficulties might this episode uncover? What if you were the one receiving these commands, how might you respond? What might you question? Where might you struggle to be faithful?

Exegesis is a bible study technique of reading/pulling information "out of" the text. Read Joshua 2 and especially pay attention to what you can pull from the text to learn about the wall that surrounds the city of Jericho.

- What was built into the city wall? What does that tell you about the size of the space?
- Where did Rahab hide the men who were spying on the city? What does that tell you about the size of the space?
- How were the men spying on the city to leave and head into the hills? What does that tell you about the size of the space?
- Putting all the exegetical information gleaned from Joshua 2 together, what can you conclude about the size of the wall that surrounds the city of Jericho?

Eisegesis is a bible study technique in which you "read into" the text that which isn't specifically said or indicated but may be a possible conclusion. Eisegesis is an opinion and shouldn't be taken as fact. However, it can be useful in helping describe a situation based on the opinions and experiences of your own life as example.

Pretend you were one of the Israelites crossing the Jordan and looking at the huge fortress wall of Jericho. Now, using eisegesis (your own opinions or experience), what might you be thinking? Consider the Word of God and instructions from Joshua 6; what might your response have been to such instructions considering the enormity of the task that lay before you? In what ways may your own faith in God's Word and promises be challenged today, especially considering the full scope of challenges facing the sanctity of life?

# Lutherans and the Tucson March for Life

Each year on the Saturday of Sanctity of Life weekend, the day following the National March for Life, approximately 80 LCMS Lutherans from around the area join in the Tucson March for Life. I am delighted to share some details on how we organize our participation.

### **Our Local Context**

I am a lay member at Catalina Lutheran Church, where I chair the Life Team. Catalina is a member congregation of the Arizona South Circuit (ASC) of the English District (ED), LCMS, as are nine other congregations in our area. Additionally, there are four in the Pacific Southwest District (PSD). Of note, three of our congregations have Life Teams. Our ASC pastors meet most months at their circuit winkels, and our circuit forum meets twice a year. Finally, I meet regularly with the Tucson for Life coalition, as have others from our LCMS congregations over the years—and learn well in advance of upcoming events.

The Tucson March is sponsored by the Roman Catholic Diocese of Tucson. The day begins with a mass at the St. Augustine Cathedral. Following the mass, the participants march from there to Holy Hope Cemetery (a distance of 4.1 miles—to my knowledge one of the longest life marches in the country!). The day ends with a rose ceremony at the cemetery, remembering the lives of those lost to abortion.

### Planning and Organization

The planning for our participation begins with our circuit visitor and pastors as we discuss the march at the winkels and the forum meetings. From there, with the permission of the circuit visitor, we send





reminder emails to the pastors, including the men serving the PSD congregations. The pastors then get word out to their congregations. Additionally, we list the march on the ED page of the LCMS Life Ministry Volunteer Portal. The LCMS sends us signs and hats based on the number who have signed up on the site to participate. Since the march is a one-way 4.1-mile walk, we arrange for some to leave their cars at each end and shuttle others from or to their vehicles.



### **Event**

While the mass is taking place, we meet across the street in an outdoor area for a time of prayer, led by our circuit visitor. We pray the *Lutheran Service Book* litany and have a time of corporate confession and absolution, remembering that we too are sinners in need of God's grace and mercy. We then join the march, grouping ourselves behind a large banner reading, "Tucson Area LCMS Congregations," which was funded by LWML and includes artwork by area children. Once we reach the end of the march, we receive a closing benediction, led by one of our pastors. Some then stay for the rose ceremony.


### Why We March

Having received God's gifts of forgiveness, life, and salvation in His divine services to us in our congregations, we jointly put on His armor (Ephesians 6:10-18) in the public square, proclaiming Christ and Him crucified for the forgiveness of sins, even those of babies still in the womb. In so doing, we advocate for the sanctity of life from the moment of fertilization and pray that God will use us to change the hearts of the abortion-minded in our community.







# Owen's Mission





# The Basics of Lutherans For Life

Our Mission: Equipping Lutherans and their neighbors to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life



**Our Vision:** Every Lutheran congregation upholding the God-given value of human life and influencing society to do the same

### Structure and Relationships

A local Life Chapter is a local organization that has been chartered by National Lutherans For Life. The Life Chapter is formally associated with and subject to, but not a part of, the corporation known as Lutherans For Life, Inc.

A State Federation is an organization that has been chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc., in a state where there are at least five chartered Life Chapters. In a state where a State Federation exists, the Life Chapters also become affiliated with the State Federation. This occurs automatically at the same time a Life Chapter becomes chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc. These relationships are basically the same whether or not the Life Chapter is incorporated. Thus, Lutherans For Life consists of a network of individual entities formally associated with each other.

### Membership Information

All officers of State Federations and Life Chapters and Life Advocates must be members in good standing of Lutheran congregations and members of National Lutherans For Life.

Membership contributions are divided among the national organization, State Federation, and local Life Chapter if it is chartered.

Life Chapters that wish to include a membership form in newsletters or correspondence are asked to maintain the form and information provided by the national office.

The local Life Chapter may not establish its own membership program since LFL has a "unified membership" program. When sending a membership form to the national office, make sure the Life Chapter name and number, if chartered, is written on the form in the space provided. This will ensure that the State Federation and local Life Chapter receive the proper remittance payment.

### **Membership Classifications**

### Annual Membership

• Annual members join by making a membership donation accompanied by a completed copy of the membership form (or by joining online).

### Sponsor Membership

- Sponsor members pledge to contribute a certain amount each month and to pray regularly for Lutherans For Life.
- Sponsor members receive a monthly letter from the executive director.
- Sponsor members are asked to renew their monthly pledge each year as part of the annual membership drive.

### The Remittance Program of LFL

All MEMBERSHIP donations are shared with the chartered State Federation and/or local Life Chapter to which the particular members may belong. The membership donations are divided as follows:

### Annual Memberships:

- 20% goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 20% goes to the State Federation.)
- 20% goes to the State Federation
- 60% remains at national

### Sponsor Memberships:

- 1/12 goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 1/12 goes to the State Federation.)
- 1/12 goes to the State Federation
- 10/12 remains at national


