



A Bible Study: Aging with Grace



America is aging. Advances in medical technology, healthcare treatments, and knowledge about nutrition and fitness are making it possible for people to live longer than ever before. Declining birth and fertility rates are also driving up the average age of the population.

It seems that we have significant discomfort with aging. Popular culture considers "old" a bad word. Advertisers and manufacturers lead us to idolize youthfulness as if human existence peaks in the late teens or early twenties. Many cover wrinkles and color away the gray. Others feel the need to apologize for slower movements and "senior moments." Waning physical faculties make everyone uncomfortable, but advocates of physician-assisted suicide go so far as to designate it "undignified."

Our Lord thinks differently about aging. His Word actually has quite a high regard for length of days. In the hands of God, advancing age can offer incomparable opportunities to receive blessings and confess Christ!

- 1. What do you think popular opinion considers as the ideal age? What do you think the Lord God sees as the ideal age (Isaiah 65:19-22)?
- 2. Do the Scriptures employ the word "elder" as more of a criticism or a compliment (Exodus 24:9-11; Numbers 11:24-25; 1 Timothy 5:17; 1 Peter 5:5; Revelation 4:4)?
- 3. What circumstances or characteristics can make advancing age similar to infancy (Isaiah 40:30; John 21:18)? What nevertheless makes it distinct from early life (2 Chronicles 10:8-19; Proverbs 20:29; Ecclesiastes 4:13)?
- 4. How does the aging process reflect and embody the sinful nature (Psalm 90:9-10; 1 Peter 1:24)? How does the aged condition reflect and embody the nature of God (Daniel 7:9; Job 12:12)?
- 5. In what ways do individuals of advanced age serve integrally in biblical history (Genesis 7:6; Genesis 17:1-2; Exodus 7:7; Job 42:16-17; Luke 1:13-18; Luke 2:36-38)?



6. What aspects of advanced age did Jesus embody in His earthly ministry (Matthew 13:54-56; Mark 15:20-21; John 19:28-29)?



- 7. What does aging reveal or remind us of regarding God and His grace (Psalm 91:16; Isaiah 46:3-4; John 15:5)?
- 8. What makes physician-assisted suicide or euthanasia such an attractive temptation for some? What superior alternatives does the way of Christ provide (Isaiah 40:31; 2 Corinthians 4:16-17)?
- 9. What gifts and ministry may we receive from our aging neighbors (Titus 2:2-5)? What can we do to celebrate and support the sanctity of their lives (1 Timothy 5:1-2)?



At the 2023 LFL National Conference a few weeks ago, we introduced the **Frontline Playbook** concept. With this new initiative, it is our intent to provide valuable materials to the Frontline that will give you ideas and useful programs that you can easily pick up and utilize in your churches. If you weren't there to hear firsthand what this is about, here is an overview of what the **Frontline Playbook** will consist of:

- A Frontline Playbook is designed to gather and share new and creative ways to repurpose existing Lutherans For Life projects and materials to utilize their full potential. In doing so, it is our hope that what may have been overlooked or not fully understood in the past will be seen as new possibilities for the future in your Frontline efforts.
- Just as a playbook might be used by a sports team to keep the team focused and working together with positive outcomes, so is our goal in providing new opportunities

for the work in the Frontlines. There is an enormous number of valuable materials in our Lutherans For Life arsenal that we intend to gather and repurpose in ways the Frontline will be inspired to utilize.

• Sometimes our Lutherans For Life programs are so jampacked with important information that due to the sheer volume and timelines when introduced, the data and useful materials are not totally utilized in the field. It is our goal to revive these materials as much as possible over time and create playbooks that will help you in planning new and exciting ways to implement these programs in your local environments.

As an example, we will provide both thematic approaches and life topical approaches to implement. We may select four appropriate topics from previous Life Week programs that will consist of devotions, fact guides, activity sheets, and videos that might be implemented at various intervals. You may use the four selections over a period of time, e.g., one a week for a month or one each quarter for a year. You may also simply choose to pick one topic with its complementary components and use it at your next planned event. We will make every effort to give you ideas and strategies for implementation with options for each. And you can use your own creativity to come up with new ways to implement that we may not have provided. Our goal is to provide you with the prepared components, and all you need do is apply them to what works best in your environment.

We pray you will find this effort both useful and effective in your Frontline For Life ministries. Sometimes it's a small tweak, and sometimes it's a bigger revamp to make what is already available more useful for your needs. We value any input you choose to provide. It is our plan to start developing these Frontline Playbooks in early 2024 and continue them going forward as they prove useful.

Is Your Life Ministry Resourced?

In our series of informative articles directed toward the Lutherans For Life ministries within the Body of Christ—Life Advocates, Life Teams, Life Chapters—we have been discussing the *Nine Facets of a Successful Life Ministry*. We believe these facets, or important principles, are essential components of your life ministries that will enable you to be fruitful and to reach your full potential as Gospel-motivated voices For Life.

So, today we want you to ask yourselves, "Is our Life ministry resourced?" What does this mean? The Oxford Language Dictionary defines the verb "resource" (past tense: "resourced") as this: "to provide (a person or organization) with materials, money, staff, and other assets **necessary for effective operation**." Too often, the Body of Christ asks their members to carry out their different ministries as volunteers with no resources whatsoever. Expenses come out of the pockets of the volunteers themselves! Those of you who are financially able may have no problem giving both your time and treasure to a particular ministry, but how long can you sustain it? What about those of you with a passion to be part of this same ministry who do not have the funds to do so? You may struggle to meet the need, but if you truly cannot afford to do so, you will be left out. Or you may choose to not even try to participate if you feel you cannot financially support the ministry, and then the joy of serving the Lord in that ministry is denied to you. Additionally, if your volunteers' financial resources run out, the ministry stops or is curtailed. Small goals may be met, but bigger dreams and projects are out of reach.

You as volunteers are also part of the "Resources." Are you adequately trained? Are you recruiting new members and nurturing and educating those you already have? What happens if the leader steps down? Will your For Life ministry continue to bear fruit or will it close? Have you encouraged your congregation to be Gospel-motivated voices for life and to be completely invested in this ministry with their prayers and deeds as well as their finances? Remember that you can engage your congregational members to be important workers in your ministry without them being actual members of your team.

Let's examine this a bit more closely. Any thriving church ministry needs financial resources, communication resources (such as access to newsletters, announcements, and the church's website), physical resources (such as meeting rooms, kitchen access, etc.) and of course staff (member) resources. As a viable and trusted ministry within the church, your Life Advocate, Life Team, or Life Chapter will need these things as well. You want your ministry's financial needs to be part of your church's budget so you can plan projects that fit within that budget. Of course, for bigger endeavors, special requests may be made as needed. Resources often follow the level of trust that is established between the life ministry and the leaders of the church. It is important for you as life ministry leaders to work closely with the leadership of your church to determine how much a project may cost and how this project will be financially supported. Working together to manage your desires for certain projects with available financing is critical, and being good stewards of these finances is equally important. Together, you and your church leaders should ensure that your projects and ministry efforts are always Gospel-motivated. (*This important facet was discussed in depth in the Directions: September-October 2023 edition, page 17.*)

It may take prayer, time, and compromise for a life ministry to become fully resourced, but the fruits of your labors will bless you, your church, and your neighbors! The table below gives you an idea of what to look at in determining how well you are resourced.



RESOURCED ITEMS	RATING: 1-4
Our life ministry has the financial resources to do what it needs to do.	
Our life ministry is given access to church resources (e.g., meeting rooms, copy machine, website, newsletter, and announcements).	
Our life ministry has the people to do what it needs to do.	
Our life ministry has the educational resources to do what it needs to do (brochures, videos, Bible studies, etc.).	
Our life ministry does activities specific to fund raising.	



Now, your determination of financial resourcing is important, but there is one more area of resourcing that is critical. Your life ministry thrives best if it is spiritually resourced as well. A special effort must be made to grow spiritually together as a life ministry with Bible study, prayer, and discussions of the needs you identify as well as the directions you must take to meet those needs. In your planning, always ensure that your ideas and projects will bring the Gospel to those around you, both within your church and without. Regularly remind your congregation that your project or program is designed to bring the Gospel-sanctity-of-life message to them and to their neighbors. The Apostle Paul's reminder to the Saints in Colossae is valid to us today:

"Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving" (Colossians 3:23-24).

We at Lutherans For Life encourage you to build and maintain relationships within your own congregations so that you will be fully resourced and fully supported—working together for the Lord and His kingdom For Life!





Owen's Mission



Horton the elephant was right! The Bible agrees! In fact, the Bible says more: A person's a person created by God (Psalm 139:13-14), a person redeemed by Jesus (Galatians 3:13), and a person the Holy Spirit wants to call to be His child (1 Timothy 2:4), *no matter how small!*

Owen's Mission is a very special project of Lutherans For Life. The goal of this project is to honor Jesus

by presenting a set of *Touch of Life* fetal models to every Lutheran elementary and high school in the country. We want students to understand the God-given value of each life from the moment of conception. We want students to be motivated by what God has done as our Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier that gives value to life. We want students to value themselves and to value others as persons because of this God-given value.

Where did Owen's Mission come from? From a very small and special baby named Owen. Rev. Dr. James I. Lamb, former executive director of Lutherans For Life, shares his story:

"I held my little grandson Owen in the palm of my hand. He died at 21 weeks during prenatal surgery to remove a large tumor. The nurse brought him to our son as we waited in the recovery room for Owen's mother. I find it difficult to describe what I felt when I was able to hold him. I had held the 20-week *Touch of Life* fetal model in my hands hundreds of times in front of students from preschoolers to seminarians. Holding Owen revived in me the reality behind those models. I will never hold them in the same way again."



As Owen's grandpa, Dr. Lamb wanted to do something special to remember Owen, honor Jesus, and help others understand the value God gives to even the smallest of lives. With the help of Owen's family, *Owen's Mission* was born. We are training facilitators to present these fetal model sets along with a DVD message from Dr. Lamb.

A local Life Chapter is a local organization that has been chartered by National Lutherans For Life. The Life Chapter is formally associated with and subject to, but not a part of, the corporation known as Lutherans For Life, Inc.

A Life Team is a group of dedicated church members forming a For Life group within one congregation to serve under the auspices of the local congregation.

A Life Advocate is an individual working to support the church's pastor in keeping the flow of educational information in front of the congregation on a regular basis. *Life Teams and Life Advocates do not qualify for the remittance program*.

A State Federation is an organization that has been chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc., in a state where there are at least five chartered Life Chapters. In a state where a State Federation exists, the Life Chapters also become affiliated with the State Federation. This occurs automatically at the same time a Life Chapter becomes chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc. These relationships are basically the same whether or not the Life Chapter is incorporated. Thus, Lutherans For Life consists of a network of individual entities formally associated with each other.

Membership Information

All officers of State Federations and Life Chapters and Life Advocates must be members in good standing of Lutheran congregations and members of National Lutherans For Life. Membership contributions are divided among the national organization, State Federation, and local Life Chapter if it is chartered.

Life Chapters that wish to include a membership form in newsletters or correspondence are asked to maintain the form and information provided by the national office. The local Life Chapter may not establish its own membership program since LFL has a "unified membership" program. When sending a membership form to the national office, make sure the Life Chapter name and number, if chartered, is written on the form in the space provided. This will ensure that the State Federation and local Life Chapter receive the proper remittance payment.

Membership Classifications

Annual Membership

• Annual members join by making a membership donation accompanied by a completed copy of the membership form (or by joining online).

Sponsor Membership

- Sponsor members pledge to contribute a certain amount each month and to pray regularly for Lutherans For Life.
- Sponsor members receive a monthly letter from the executive director.
- Sponsor members are asked to renew their monthly pledge each year as part of the annual membership drive.

The Remittance Program of LFL

All MEMBERSHIP donations are shared with the chartered State Federation and/or local Life Chapter to which the particular members may belong. The membership donations are divided as follows:

Annual Memberships:

- 20% goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 20% goes to the State Federation.)
- 20% goes to the State Federation
- 60% remains at national

Sponsor Memberships:

- 1/12 goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 1/12 goes to the State Federation.)
- 1/12 goes to the State Federation
- 10/12 remains at national


