

On April 8 ... Dave Probst, LFL's Director of Development, will share the details about our upcoming 2024 Step Up 4 Life fundraising campaign. Learn how you can witness to and affirm the value of human life by participating in our Step Up 4 Life campaign from May 12 through June 24. There are a variety of ways to participate: You may host a congregational 4 Life Day, plan a Frontline Step Up 4 Life Event, or make a direct donation to LFL. Dave will highlight vital resources and materials that you can use to successfully Step Up 4 Life and support the mission of LFL at the same time.

Robert Wegner, the President of the Peoria (Illinois) Area LFL #268, will share with us a great new twist on their diaper drive project. Besides collecting diapers for their regional pregnancy resource centers, they collect packages of adult protective underwear, such as the Depend® brand, to donate to local nursing homes. A Bible Study: Is This Not the Carpenter's Son?



March 25 marks the Festival of the Annunciation of Our Lord. From the word "announce," this occasion celebrates the angel Gabriel delivering the news of our Savior's incarnation to the blessed virgin Mary in Nazareth of Galilee (Luke 1:26-38). A shrine there to this day indicates the location where tradition holds the miracle happened. The Holy Spirit brought Godwith-Us, not first as a full-grown adult but conceived as an embryo in our sister's belly.

This holiday obviously occurs exactly nine months prior to Christmas. Our Lord dwelt among us for quite some time without anyone seeing or meeting Him. Yet in this span, He consecrated and sanctified every human life from its very beginning at the moment of fertilization. And He demonstrated that neither age nor appearance nor ability—nor any lack thereof—improves or impairs anyone's worth. God creates, redeems, and calls each one as His own to start with.

The date, though, does not derive from Christmas but rather vice versa. Early Christians memorialized March 25 as the day Jesus died. The annual Passover ceremonies have taken place around that time for millennia (determined by the movements of the sun and the moon as instructed in Genesis 1:14). Ancient theologians concluded that the coming of the Christ and His dying for our sins must have coincided on the calendar with when creation transpired and our first parents fell. Since they furthermore believed that the onset of spring echoes when the Lord God commenced His creating labors, these other events must also have happened on or near the vernal equinox (when the planet witnesses exactly twelve hours of daylight and twelve hours of darkness at the transition of seasons according to the Earth's solar orbit). The Almighty Maker inaugurates His new creation in the very days when the universe recalls He initiated the first one. These Christians then calculated the day of His birth on this basis, and the fact that it falls very near the winter solstice only strengthened its significance to them.

The Western Christian tradition has long honored St. Joseph six days prior. Though Mary's husband did not beget Jesus from his own body, he did father him in the fashion of a foster, adoptive, or step-parent. For this reason, he has received the title of Guardian of Our Lord. His service to God and family not only figures prominently in the Gospel of Jesus Christ but also exemplifies the holy vocation of fatherhood and testifies to the sanctity of marriage, parenting, adoption, and every human life.

3. Open to Matthew 1:18-25. What emotions might Joseph have experienced upon discovering Mary's circumstances? Resentment? Regret? Resolve? Betrayal? Embarrassment? Apprehension? Anticipation? Amusement? Why or why not?



- 4. How would it have benefitted Mary for Joseph to "divorce her quietly"?
- 5. What actions of Joseph saved Jesus in His early days (Matthew 1:24; Matthew 2:14, 22-23)? What burdens do you imagine this brought to the family? What blessings?
- 6. What stands out about Joseph's family background (Luke 2:4; Matthew 1:1-16; 1 Chronicles 17:11-15)? How did Joseph's identity bring Jesus not only honor but also humility (Matthew 13:55-57; John 1:46)? Why did this prove especially important (Philippians 2:5-8)?
- 7. What does New Testament Joseph have in common with Old Testament Joseph (Genesis 37:19; Matthew 2:13-21; Genesis 50:20)?
- 8. What did Jesus learn from Joseph (Luke 2:51-52; Mark 6:3)? How did this help Him in His mission (Hebrews 5:2, 7-9)?
- 9. Why do you think Joseph disappears from the Gospel narratives after Jesus' childhood? What important messages does it amplify (John 19:25-27; Matthew 12:50; Luke 23:46; Galatians 4:4-7)?
- 10. How do you see God inviting and encouraging us toward the sanctity of life through Joseph's servanthood and faith?

Lutheran Adoption Conference to Unite Leaders, Impact Adoption Crisis



More than 114,000 children in the U.S. are currently awaiting an adoptive home and a forever family (AFCARS, 2021). Lutheran leaders across the nation are urgently called to attend the Lutheran Adoption Conference, April 10-11, 2024, in Houston, Texas, at the Hyatt Regency Intercontinental Airport. At this conference, Lutheran pro-life leaders, policy makers, adoption experts, and life issue advocates will collaborate and explore ways to impact the national adoption crisis through the increase of biblically-based Christian/Lutheran adoptions.



"The recent Dobbs decision has increased the need for adoption, and there is a void of biblically-based Christian adoption agencies in the U.S. These two realities necessitate urgent action and collaboration to help renew the Church and her people's involvement in this life- and faithgiving act of love," said Rev. Max Phillips, Executive Director, Lutheran Family Service.

The Lutheran Adoption Conference is designed to connect dedicated leaders and organizations across the United States to act as a unified group with urgency and to impact the souls of thousands of babies each year. People hear the voices of pro-life leaders and organizations; however, this is the time to match word with action and to be a force for God's truth For Life. The conference is based upon the premise of Esther 4:14: "for such a time as this." The Lutheran Adoption Conference will be the birthplace of the "Lutherans Adopt" movement, and attendees have the opportunity for ground-floor participation, shaping the future of biblically-based adoption in America.

"Gospel-motivated Lutherans can't ignore the hundreds of thousands of children in need of families and homes. For several decades we've been able to collaborate in good faith with the government and public sector in reaching them, but that's becoming endangered by immoral and non-biblical ideologies. Given the Christian Church's centuries-long legacy of orphan care, it's time for us to take the lead again. This conference represents an important step in that course of action," states Rev. Michael Salemink, Executive Director, Lutherans For Life.

Keynote speaker and former adoptee, Mark Schultz, will share both his adoption story and talents as a Dove Award-winning musician. Additional adoption stories will be shared touching on embryo rescue, infant adoption, and foster care. Lutheran leaders will facilitate important round-table discussions and lead informative and engaging sessions. Hear from and collaborate with Rev. Bob Fleischmann, National Director of Christian Life Resources; Rev. Michael Salemink, Executive Director of Lutherans For Life; Rev. Max Phillips, Executive Director of Lutheran Family Service; Rev. Dr. Jim Lamb, Life Advocate for Lutheran Family Service; and Kim Laube, Deputy Director of Lutheran Family Service. Additional leaders and experts are currently being added to the speaker/facilitator roster as well as the attendee list. Discover expert information, mission-driven collaboration, and exciting opportunities.

"Adoption represents the opportunity to imitate Christ's love and share the message of salvation. This conference is the inaugural step in what we hope will connect generations of children with Lutheran homes grounded in biblical truth at the cross of Christ," said Rev. Bob Fleischmann.

Is Your Life Ministry TRUSTED?

There are nine aspects of a healthy Life Chapter or Life Team that we have been learning about in this *Directions* series. So far, we have deepened our understanding of **Gospel-motivated**, **Unified**, **Consistent**, **Multi-faceted**, **Resourced**, and **Interfaced**. Many of us have found that when we incorporate these aspects within our life ministry group, we make a greater impact For Life!

Our focus today is on the aspect **TRUSTED**. This aspect is a truly critical one as we will see. The Oxford Languages dictionary defines trusted as being "regarded as reliable or truthful" as in "a trusted advisor." Synonyms are credible, dependable, honorable, loyal, and reliable. The word means "an assured reliance on the character, ability, strength, or truth of someone. Great relationships give life [and Life Ministries] significantly more purpose." ¹

So, what traits do trusted individuals have?¹

- 1. They are consistent. They have the self-control to maintain character and follow through on what they say they'll do.
- 2. They show compassion and humility. Both these traits demonstrate that they think well of others and don't consider themselves as more important than anyone else.
- 3. They respect boundaries. They don't try to impose their will on others because they don't feel the need to control those around them. They avoid bullying.
- 4. They compromise and don't expect something for nothing. As trust is a two-way street, they are willing to give a little now to get something back later.
- 5. They are relaxed (and so are you). If the person seems at ease, they likely have nothing to hide and are being honest and open with you.
- 6. They are respectful when it comes to time. Trustworthy people do their best not to be late or cancel plans at the last minute because they know doing so inconveniences you and violates promises.
- 7. They show gratitude. Trustworthy individuals are willing to admit they can't do it all alone and value teamwork. They give credit where it's due.
- 8. They give up all the facts, even if it hurts. Truth and transparency matter to trustworthy people.
- 9. They confide in you. It demonstrates that they already trust you and that they want you to be open with them as well.
- 10. They do not gossip. They prefer to get information from the source and to let the source speak for itself. They avoid rumors. When they do talk, their language is empowering and respectful.



11. They are learners and know they don't have all the answers. They look for ways to learn and improve themselves and are willing to share the resources and facts they find.



12. They are there for you and for others. They will listen to and support you. They do their best to be available to help, whatever you might be going through.

Wow! This is quite the list of traits for a trusted individual, but now is when it gets a little tricky! Life Teams and Chapters may have anywhere from three to thirty members, so does this mean we need all of them to be trusted for the Life Team or Life Chapter to be trusted? Short answer? Yes. How can this happen? Relationships. Relationships between the individual members and Jesus their Lord and relationships between the members themselves can lead to trust. It does not and cannot happen all at once. It takes time. As we trust in the Lord for our strength and direction, He helps us learn to trust one another. By definition, a Life Team (or Life Chapter) is a group that works together in harmony. A big step toward this harmony is to become more trustworthy—more dependable, honorable, and loyal. As each Life Team or Life Chapter member grows in trustworthiness, so does the Life Team or Life Chapter itself.

Once we know our Life Team and Life Chapter members are trustworthy, how does this relate to our relationship with our congregation itself? A trusted Life Ministry group *as a whole* should exhibit the following characteristics:

- Have open communication with your church leadership so ideas can be discussed and adopted.
- Seek counsel from your church leadership or pastoral advisor. Attendance by the pastoral advisor is very important in planning your goals, mission, and projects.
- Follow through with assigned tasks.
- All members of the team/chapter should intentionally offer their support to the goals and missions.
- Meet regularly with your pastor(s) to monitor your life ministry, check on progress, and discuss new ministry ideas.





- Encourage the congregation to take an active role in the life events and activities planned for your congregation. Ask for your pastor's support in this.
- Above all, continue to develop relationships with your own church members as "ministry flows from relationships."



Repentance and forgiveness also play an important role in the trustworthiness of your life ministry. Words may be spoken or mistakes may be made that impact your group and thus the congregation. Prompt intervention with grace, love, and forgiveness can make a big impact.


"Above all, keep loving one another earnestly, since love covers a multitude of sins" (1 Peter 4:8).

We have focused thus far on the trustworthiness of the individuals on our Life Team or in our Life Chapter, which in turn earns the trust of our congregations. But sometimes our trustworthiness fails; our harmony is broken. Thankfully, there is *One* above all that we can *trust* above all. That is our Heavenly Father. As we turn to Him individually and together as a Life Team or Life Chapter, He is always there. He is the most trustworthy, dependable, and loyal person we will ever know. We can totally rely on *His* character, ability, strength, and truth. What a wonderful promise, and what a perfect model of trust for us all.

"Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths" (Proverbs 3:5-6).

The Precious Feet program congratulates and honors parents at the time of their child's Baptism and creates awareness of the LFL Lifelines Life Chapter. The Precious Feet pin and a "Your New Baby – A Gift from God" card are presented to the family at their child's Baptism during a worship service. This program is provided to all twelve Carver County LCMS churches and to the congregation in Winsted, Minnesota.

Another option is to present a Precious Feet pin to both sets of parents as a nice gesture. They can proudly wear one pin and save the other for the child to keep for when they grow.





Losing a child at any age is heartbreaking, and sometimes, because of the circumstances, the parent(s) never have the chance to mourn that loss or to find the healing that Jesus offers.

In 2021, the Life Team at Zion Lutheran Church Wayside in Greenleaf, Wisconsin, responded to their pastor's idea to create an **Infant Mourning Garden** to provide a quiet place for people who had lost a child to find peace and healing as they spent time there in communion with the Lord. They printed articles in their newsletters and bulletins promoting the idea, and as they did so, *many* women in their seventies or eighties came forward. With weeping and sorrow-filled voices, they shared how much they appreciated a place to mourn the child or children they had lost. They shared how years ago, if one lost a child through miscarriage or stillbirth, it was common practice to immediately take the baby's body away. The mother never saw her child, never held her child, could not mourn her loss, and could find no closure in the Christian burial of her child. And no one *ever* mentioned the incident again. Losing a child to abortion was even more quietly handled and equally devastating for many women.





The Life Team now knew this was a needed ministry in their congregation. A member of their church who worked for a driveway company donated much of his time, labor, and materials. It took about a year to finish the main heart and sidewalk, to install the pavers for the cross, and to do the basic landscaping. Many people found healing before it was even completed. A woman who worked at a local landscaping business from whom they bought the trees learned what the garden ministry was all about. She believed this was a beautiful outreach that would touch people's lives, including her



own, so she donated a beautiful fountain. An older woman wept openly as she sat on a bench and grieved the stillborn child lost decades before. She bought a paver for the cross, had it inscribed with heartfelt words, and was able to view it in the garden when her daughter brought her to visit just a few weeks before she passed away. The benches were donated by a family who had lost a grandchild due to illness.

The garden is open to the community, and the church promotes it regularly. People can buy a tree and have a small plaque placed in memory of their child, or they can have a paver inscribed with a meaningful message. It cost about \$2,500.00 for this beautiful garden, even with the donations, and it occupies a large space next to the church cemetery. They have continued to add other features over the last two years, and it has become a magnificent place to meet the Lord.

But what if you do not have the space or the finances for such a garden? Trust the Lord and know that a small garden can be just as meaningful. A bench, a small tinkling fountain, and a few grasses to whisper in the breeze can be placed under a tree, a small gazebo, or a trellis in the smallest of places in your church yard. Special Bible verses—perhaps on a paver or on a small plaque on the bench—will impact the heart and soul.

Cross Lutheran Church and School in Yorkville, Illinois, also has a beautiful memory garden. It became a reality in 2014 and continues to minister to families. One great idea was this: They asked members at church, "When you have gone through a hard, difficult time, which verse from the Bible helped you?" The life group then purchased pavers with those verses engraved on them and added them to the garden.

Hope and healing *will* be found whenever and wherever we commune with our Heavenly Father. If we sit quietly in His beautiful creation, we know the Holy Spirit will draw us closer to Jesus, the Great Healer of hearts. Our awesome Triune God longs to bring us comfort and healing, so let us create a place where He can be met by those whose hearts need His healing touch.

Jesus invites all whose hearts are burdened with grief, regret, guilt, or sorrow to come to Him:


"Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light" (Matthew 11:29-30).







Life Project: The Blessings of Baptism



This project is shared by St. John's Lutheran Church & School Life Team in Grand Haven, Michigan.

The idea came from the Lutherans For Life booklet, *How You Can "Speak"* (LFL100B). One of the ideas noted in the booklet was to "share God's Word about the blessings of Baptism."

The **Blessings of Baptism** project was introduced at a Life Team meeting and scheduled for Life Sunday in 2020. Invitations were mailed to families with baptized children from 2019. Two families came to the celebration. Pastor William Cate preached a life message, followed by a Bible study. Families were recognized at the altar during worship and received long-stemmed red roses. (In 2021, the event was scheduled, but sadly no one came due to COVID-19. The Life Team decided to skip the event in 2022.)

In May of 2023, St John's Lutheran Church was blessed with the addition of Pastor Aaron Vergin. Baptisms were occurring every month. The Life Team celebrated Protect Life Sunday in October, and as they were planning their fall activities, they considered bringing back the Baptism celebration.

Life Team Leader Paula Cate approached Pastor Vergin about hosting the baptism celebration in January of 2024. Pastor Vergin was enthusiastic, and the event was added to the church calendar on Sunday, January 14, 2024, in correlation with the day to remember the Baptism of Jesus. Although winter weather snowstorms played a factor, the congregation celebrated God's gift of Baptism with four families.





Blessings of Baptism Timeline (2-3 months)

- Gain approval from the pastor and engage him in the planning process.
- Confirm the event date on the church calendar and reserve any rooms needed.
- Develop an event budget. (The Life Team's budget was around \$100 for gifts, the invitation mailing, and refreshments. The Life Team self-funded the project.)
- Gather the names and address of the families with baptized member(s) from the year.
- Create and mail invitations 4-6 weeks in advance. (The Life Team mailed nine families a hand-addressed invitation and greeting. The invitation read, "Please join the Life Team of St. John's Lutheran Church as we celebrate and thank God for your child's Baptism. All families of children baptized into the saving grace of Jesus during 2023 are invited to participate.")
- Collaborate with the pastor and/or the worship team to plan the details for the recognition of the families during worship. (Families were recognized during worship one at a time. Each family was called to the front of the sanctuary and received a long-stemmed red rose and a handmade white dove constructed out of paper with the child's name and Baptism date.)
- Organize food and refreshments for celebration and fellowship after the worship service. (The Life Team served cookies, coffee, tea, and water.)
- Promote the event. (Utilize your church's communication resources—bulletin board, email, newsletter, printed bulletin, or Facebook page.)
- Determine recognition for all participants. Be creative! (The Life Team created posters with all the names of the baptized members.)
- Worship Service Celebration & Fellowship (The families were celebrated one at a time during worship. Outside the sanctuary, the Life Team organized a Lutherans For Life display with brochures, children's worship coloring sheets, and posters with all the participants' names. Refreshments and fellowship followed worship.)

Reflections from the Life Team

Paula Cate, Life Team Leader, reflected on the celebration:

"This event was a blessing for our church family to witness how the Lord had added to our church during the previous year. Seeing the babies, children, and families together was a joyous occasion. The fellowship that followed provided an opportunity to become acquainted with the parents and a chance to admire the little ones."

The Life Team enjoyed doing this activity and hope to repeat it in 2025!

What Is World Down Syndrome Day?



Above all, be the love and light of Christ to all you meet who need extra love and support. Be the one to show the world the value of *every* person as *all* are created in the image of God our Father.







Owen's Mission



"I held my little grandson Owen in the palm of my hand. He died at 21 weeks during prenatal surgery to remove a large tumor. The nurse brought him to our son as we waited in the recovery room for Owen's mother. I find it difficult to describe what I felt when I was able to hold him. I had held the 20-week *Touch of Life* fetal model in my hands hundreds of times in front of students from preschoolers to seminarians. Holding Owen revived in me the reality behind those models. I will never hold them in the same way again."





As Owen's grandpa, Dr. Lamb wanted to do something special to remember Owen, honor Jesus, and help others understand the value God gives to even the smallest of lives. With the help of Owen's family, *Owen's Mission* was born. We are training facilitators to present these fetal model sets along with a DVD message from Dr. Lamb.

The Basics of Lutherans For Life

Our Mission: Equipping Lutherans and their neighbors to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life Our Vision: Every Lutheran congregation upholding the God-given value of human life and influencing society to do the same

Structure and Relationships

A local Life Chapter is a local organization that has been chartered by National Lutherans For Life. The Life Chapter is formally associated with and subject to, but not a part of, the corporation known as Lutherans For Life, Inc.

A Life Team is a group of dedicated church members forming a For Life group within one congregation to serve under the auspices of the local congregation.

A Life Advocate is an individual working to support the church's pastor in keeping the flow of educational information in front of the congregation on a regular basis. Life Teams and Life Advocates do not qualify for the remittance program.

A State Federation is an organization that has been chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc., in a state where there are at least five chartered Life Chapters. In a state where a State Federation exists, the Life Chapters also become affiliated with the State Federation. This occurs automatically at the same time a Life Chapter becomes chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc. These relationships are basically the same whether or not the Life Chapter is incorporated. Thus, Lutherans For Life consists of a network of individual entities formally associated with each other.

Membership Information

All officers of State Federations and Life Chapters and Life Advocates must be members in good standing of Lutheran congregations and members of National Lutherans For Life. Membership contributions are divided among the national organization, State Federation, and local Life Chapter if it is chartered.

Life Chapters that wish to include a membership form in newsletters or correspondence are asked to maintain the form and information provided by the national office. The local Life Chapter may not establish its own membership program since LFL has a "unified membership" program. When sending a membership form to the national office, make sure the Life Chapter name and number, if chartered, is written on the form in the space provided. This will ensure that the State Federation and local Life Chapter receive the proper remittance payment.

Membership Classifications

Annual Membership

 Annual members join by making a membership donation accompanied by a completed copy of the membership form (or by joining online).

Sponsor Membership

- Sponsor members pledge to contribute a certain amount each month and to pray regularly for Lutherans For Life.
- Sponsor members receive a monthly letter from the executive director.
- Sponsor members are asked to renew their monthly pledge each year as part of the annual membership drive.

The Remittance Program of LFL

All MEMBERSHIP donations are shared with the chartered State Federation and/or local Life Chapter to which the particular members may belong. The membership donations are divided as follows:

Annual Memberships:

- 20% goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 20% goes to the State Federation.)
- 20% goes to the State Federation
- 60% remains at national

Sponsor Memberships:

- 1/12 goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 1/12 goes to the State Federation.)
- 1/12 goes to the State Federation
- 10/12 remains at national


