Perhaps you've heard that there's a new epidemic in town. According to the latest studies, over one-third of Americans are infected by it, and in some demographics, up to 60% of the population suffers. In the elderly, the contagion increases one's risk of cognitive decline, dementia, and death. Infected youth are more likely to suffer from depression, anxiety, and substance abuse.

The name of this invasive epidemic? Loneliness.

In a perfect world, loneliness wouldn't exist.
