

# A Bible Study: Sanctity of Human Life in Genesis



The Scriptures begin with God's love and delight for life. Of course, it doesn't stop there—every book of the Bible delivers this delightful truth. But it means something important that everything starts with this emphasis. It evidences that He has a particular fondness and preference for humankind. The Almighty Maker loves humankind in its entirety and every human life in particular.

In fact, the grand narrative proclaims that He longs for fellowship with the whole race. The Lord likes to engage and interact with mortals. So these earliest dealings detailed in Genesis inaugurate an ongoing pattern and propensity for bending Himself over backward to protect, provide, and keep them close. He finds these beings special, and this goes for each of us—not just the prime and pristine ones. The saga's Hero draws near and holds dear even when the accompanying cast render themselves and one another weak and unworthy.

And the chronicle directly addresses several of our contemporary sanctity-of-life issues. Genesis features actors, events, and settings that make clear we need not—we must not—use death as a solution to difficulties. Rather, divine grace regards and invests our kind with significance and sanctity, worth and purpose that circumstances can neither impair nor improve. From before history until beyond eternity, the Most High makes every human person precious.

- 1. Do you find it easier to start a task or to finish it? Why?
- 2. What handiwork or artifact that you have created do you take most pride in? What has come of it since you brought it into being?
- 3. In Genesis 1:26-28, which words designate man as exceptional among the creatures? To whom do these accolades apply? And in Genesis 2:7, 21-22, what divine actions elevate the eminence of the first man and woman? How do these activities continue in our time?
- 4. According to Genesis 4:1; 25:21; and 30:1-2, 22-23, what constitutes the decisive factor in procreation? How does this compare to present attitudes about sexuality and fertility—even among Christians? How might it cause reconsiderations of contraceptive strategies or rationales for delaying marriage?

5. What do Genesis 4:10-15 and 9:5-6 demonstrate about the Lord our God's disposition toward the taking of human life? Whom else does His Law hold accountable for safeguarding an individual's survival? How did He display Cain's dignity even after he became criminal? Could this relate at all to what we call disability or disfigurement?



- 6. Genesis gives special attention to aging. What assessment of getting old do Genesis 5:3-19; 12:1-4; 21:1-5; and 25:7-8 reveal? How does this affirm or adjust your appraisal of advancing in years? What problems does our culture commonly identify with later life, and what solutions does it suggest for them? What, in the eyes of the Bible, represents the real problem?
- 7. Sexual immorality happens just as often in the pages of Genesis as it does among our people. How does it turn out in Genesis 16:1-6; 19:11-3; 26:34-35; 34:1-2, 25-27; and 38:9-10? What consequences does it perpetrate in our context?
- 8. Genesis 22:9-14 portrays an attempt at employing death to overcome an apparently inescapable predicament. It even has a reasonable justification. How does the Heavenly Father intervene? What principle—explicitly stated—does it dictate about the sanctity of life in uncertainties? How does Genesis 3:14-15 specifically relate this to childbearing? And how does Genesis 25:22-23 extend divine favor undeniably within the womb?
- 9. The Almighty does not even allow our guilt to locate us outside His goodwill. What comfort and hope does Genesis 50:15-21 deliver to those of us who have participated in violence against life? How can this motivate us to speak truth and show love as voices For Life?



# Life Project: Baby Bottle Drive

This project is shared by the Life Team at St. Peter Lutheran Church in Macomb, Michigan.



"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born, I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations" (Jeremiah 1:5).

Your Change Can Change a Life! A Baby Bottle Drive is an easy and fun way to involve members of your State Federation, Life Chapter, Life Team, congregation, and school families in supporting a Gospel-focused pregnancy resource center simply by filling a baby bottle with coins, cash, and checks. Every donation, large or small, is life-changing.

"The Life Team at St. Peter Lutheran Church in Macomb, Michigan, exists to educate, encourage, and empower the members of our congregation to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life. Our mission statement is applied to all the events and activities we do. We are truly blessed by the generosity of our congregation and school students who have faithfully supported us each year with their donations that support our three pregnancy resource centers." *Carol Poterek, Life Team Leader* 

St. Peter Lutheran Church has participated in the Baby Bottle Drive for nine years and raised a total of \$38,188.53. Praise the Lord for His faithfulness! The 2023 Baby Bottle Drive raised \$4,639. Of the funds collected, the Life Team donated 10% to LFL National, \$500 to the Life Team budget, and the remaining funds were divided locally between Abigayle Ministries, Compassion Pregnancy Center, and The Luke Project 52 Clinic. The Life Team celebrates the success of the campaign and shows appreciation to the congregation by placing a thank you note in their weekly church bulletin and monthly newsletter.



Ruthann Bettcher has chaired the Baby Bottle Drive at St. Peter Lutheran Church for the past nine years. St. Peter's Life Team holds their Baby Bottle Drive in the month of January. Compassion Pregnancy Center provides 300 bottles for the Baby Bottle Drive. For distribution, the Life Team places the baby bottles in four large boxes wrapped in baby-themed wrapping paper. The boxes are located around the narthex of the church for the month of January.

On Life Sunday, in addition to the Baby Bottle Drive, the Life Team displays their life banner, hosts a life information display table in the narthex, and distributes the LFL Life Sunday bulletin inserts. (*The 2025 bulletin inserts and other Life Sunday resources will be available this fall on the Lutherans For Life website.*) The Life Team displays a bulletin board in the back of the church highlighting the Baby Bottle Drive and the pregnancy resource centers that are supported. They advertise in the weekly bulletin, monthly church newsletter, and in the pre-service announcements.

# Steps to Host a Baby Bottle Drive

Work with your pastor and check your church calendar to determine a date to start your Baby Bottle Drive. The campaign can be held in conjunction with Life Week, Life Month, Mother's Day to Father's Day, or any other time of the year. (It is suggested to distribute the baby bottles two to four weeks before the collection date.)



1. **Recruit** – Determine a volunteer to coordinate the Baby Bottle Drive campaign. The Baby Bottle Drive coordinator organizes the campaign by working with the pregnancy resource center, by arranging the details and logistics for the campaign at church, by recruiting volunteers to serve at the event, and by handling the publicity for the event.



- 2. **Contact** Partner with a local pregnancy resource center to assist you with the campaign. Typically, they will provide baby bottles and publicity materials for the event. If you don't have that option, you can purchase baby bottles at Heritage House '76 (www. pro.life). Watch for sales on baby bottles and order in quantities to reduce cost.
- 3. **Promote** Announce the Baby Bottle Drive in the church bulletin, newsletter, social media, and from the pulpit leading up to the collection period; distribute posters or flyers; or create a bulletin board. Note: Let the congregation know how the funds raised will be distributed.
- 4. **Distribute** Set up a display with the baby bottles. You can utilize a bassinet, pack 'n play, or baskets to hold the baby bottles. Another option is to have volunteers at each entrance to the sanctuary to distribute the baby bottles as the guests leave worship.
- 5. Collect Determine a collection date and a designated location for the return of the bottles at the end of the collection period. Blessing the collected baby bottle during worship is a great way to send them on their way to those who will receive them. Determine if the church will be counting the funds or if the pregnancy resource center will handle the money.
- 6. **Celebrate** Rejoice at the impact For Life! Celebrate with the members how much was raised for women and their families in the area.



# Other Options to Enhance the Baby Bottle Drive

- **Life Display** Set up a display table with LFL print resources available from Concordia Publishing House and other visual items such as a large size baby bottle, fetal models, and baby feet pins which are available at Heritage House '76.
- Baby Shower Combine your Baby Bottle Drive with a baby shower and collect four or five requested items (baby clothing, baby board books, diapers, formula, wipes) to support the pregnancy resource center.
- **Guest Speaker** Invite a staff member from the pregnancy resource center to speak for a few minutes during a worship service to inform the members about the center.
- **Virtual Baby Bottle Drive** Work with your local pregnancy center to see if this is an option. Sometimes donations can be given online by this means.

Baby Bottle Drives are an important source of funds that allow pregnancy resource centers to provide necessary services to those in need. Dropping coins in a baby bottle is a wonderful example of sharing personal generosity and kindness by both adults and children. Your change can have a direct impact on a life!



utherans For Life has produced a set of training manuals called the Life Team Tool Kit that has been utilized over the years to help encourage the formation of Life Teams within our Lutheran churches. We discovered that the information in these tools is equally valuable for helping our Life Advocates and Life Chapters in their life ministries as well. This fact was the impetus for our series in our Directions newsletter about the "Nine Facets of a Healthy Life Ministry." In Tool 3, Life Team Member Training, Module 3, we learned about each of these desirable traits. The word facet was chosen because, as the facet of a cut gem reflects light, so we are to reflect the light of Christ in our life ministries. The following summaries are taken from the training manual and are also found in our Volunteer Relations brochure.

#### **GOSPEL-MOTIVATED**

A Gospel-motivated group is focused on gratitude to God for being rescued by Christ in the Gospel. At your meetings, discuss how to connect your equipping initiatives to the Gospel, pray for one an-

other and your churches, and remind one another of your identity as God's beloved.

#### **UNIFIED**

When you are unified, you are working in harmony with God and each other. Unified life ministries have a clear mission statement, have specific processes in place to guide their work, and ensure each member uses their unique gifts to serve others.

#### **CONSISTENT**

A healthy life group seeks regular opportunities to engage their churches in the life arena throughout the year. An intentional presence of carefully paced actions will avoid overwhelming the life group and the churches.

### **MULTI-FACETED**

The life arena is not about a single issue but about many different life issues. A multi-faceted life group is constantly learning, both personally and as a group, what life issues are currently important to share with their churches.

### **TRUSTED**

Trust is critical in the relationship between the life group and the churches served. Trust is developed over time, since ministry flows from relationships.



#### **RESOURCED**

A resourced life group has access to both spiritual and financial support so they can carry out their mission.

#### **INTERFACED**

When a life group is interfaced, it has good working relationships with other Christian, life-affirming agencies.

#### CAREFUL

A careful group knows their churches well, understands their current interest in life issues, knows the level of knowledge they have, and knows the degree of involvement they desire. The life group simplifies issues to meet their people where they are and always speaks the truth with love and grace.

#### **MULTIPLIED**

A multiplied life group is one that has engaged other groups in their churches to become involved in the life arena as well. The life group may also partner with another life group to expand their life ministry.

Now that you have a basic understanding of the definition of these nine important facets of a healthy life ministry, we invite you to read the following articles for a more detailed, comprehensive description of what each one of these facets can mean for your life ministry.

We encourage you to review these facets on a regular basis to ensure that your ministry is on target and functioning in a healthy way. # 2024 LFL National Essay Contest


The annual Lutherans For Life Essay Contest, sponsored by the Council of Federation Presidents, continues to offer our Lutheran students the opportunity to affirm and express their belief in the sanctity of life. The theme this year is **Life Shines** in Darkness, using the Bible verse, "In him was life, and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:4-5).

The national essay contest is offered to students in two categories: grades 6-8 and grades 9-12. Students in both Federation states and Non-Federation states are eligible to participate. After each state has submitted their first-place winner, a national committee selects a national first-place and second-place winner in each category. Any student in a Lutheran school or Lutheran congregation (e.g., confirmation class, youth group, Lutheran home school) is eligible when validated by their teacher or pastor, along with parental consent.

All state winners should be commended on winning at their state level. The national first-place award is \$250, a framed certificate, free LFL conference registration for both the student and parents, a free hotel stay for the conference, and \$200 for travel expenses. The second-place award for both categories is \$125 and a framed certificate. The Council of Federation Presidents just voted to increase the awards for 2025. # 2024 LFL Grades 9-12 National Essay Contest Winners

First Place: Claire Jankee, Delano, Minnesota. She is 15 years old and was a freshman at Mayer Lutheran High School in Mayer, MN, when she won her award. She is the daughter of Lyle and Melissa Jankee, and has two siblings, Ben and Eliza. Do you know what the darkest spiritual place is in your city? Elizabeth Johnston, author and pro-life activist, posed this question to her followers (elizabethjohnston.org). The answer: your local abortion clinic. This world is full of sinful and dark places where the most evil of human acts occur, but Jesus came to offer us hope and light in the midst of the darkness that our sin so often leads us into. One of these lights, when talking about abortion, is the pregnancy care centers that seek to offer women and their partners hope in a time of uncertainty and also give



the unborn a chance at life. God's Word is very clear about shining light in the darkness. In John 1:4-5, it is written that "In him was life, and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not overcome it." Our family has been a strong supporter of local pregnancy centers, and I feel this is one of the most urgent matters of our time—supporting women as they go through an unplanned pregnancy and helping people to realize that God has a plan for every life, planned or not.



Pregnancy care centers are there for women when they find themselves in an unplanned and desperate situation. Just like Jesus was there for the little lamb when it was lost, carrying it to safety, a pregnancy care center acts as the "hands and feet of Jesus" to those with an unplanned pregnancy. Pregnancy centers offer women free ultrasounds and counseling, along with care and support once a baby is born. These centers have been proven to offer both a life and a future to the mother and the child. God's Word tells us that each life has value, and each human being is an image bearer of Him. When a woman walks into an abortion clinic, she is not being told of the value her child holds. All she is offered is a way out of a situation that will only lead to loss of life and immeasurable despair and grief that she will carry with her for the rest of her life. Pregnancy centers offer so much more to the mother and baby!

The sanctity of life is affirmed many times throughout the Bible, and it is our Christian duty to uphold what God has so clearly stated in His Word. Just a few of these verses that speak clearly to this are Genesis 1:27: "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them," Psalm 139:13-16: "For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful; I know that full well. My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth. Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be," and Jeremiah 1:4-5: "The word of the Lord came to me, saying, 'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart; I appointed you as a prophet to the nations."

Unplanned pregnancies are not the only situations where abortion is often looked to. Babies diagnosed with life-altering conditions and disabilities are also at a higher risk of termination. One example is babies diagnosed with Down syndrome *in utero*. In the U.S., 60-90% of babies with Down syndrome are aborted (United States Congress Joint Economic Committee). The thought of having a child with Down syndrome is overwhelming to many parents. The unknowns of health issues and providing a lifetime of care for their child can leave many parents feeling overwhelmed, and they may feel like abortion is their only option. This is another opportunity where a pregnancy care center can guide the mother and father in choosing life for their child. Pregnancy care centers are the light in the midst of the darkness.


My prayer is that more people would come to know and understand the sanctity of life. It is through our nation's pregnancy care centers that women can find hope and direction, but most importantly, find the value in saving the life of their unborn child. Until Christ makes His return, all of those who proclaim to be believers and followers of Him need to step into these situations to uphold the sanctity of life and give voice to the voiceless.



Thank you, Claire, for your voice and your actions supporting those who cannot speak for themselves. Thank you for reminding us that we, as followers of Jesus, do care about unborn babies *and* moms and dads. All people are created in the image of God, and our role in life is to help people see the value and sanctity of that gift of Life. Yours is a special voice doing just that.



Second Place: Andrew Kohlmeyer, of Tecumseh, Nebraska, won second place at the national level in the 9-12 grade category and was in the eleventh grade when he won his award. He is homeschooled and attends St. John Lutheran Church in Tecumseh, where his father is the pastor. Andrew has two older sisters, one of whom is married and expecting a child in September. He loves making his family smile and creating stop-motion short films. In school he enjoys learning biblical languages such as Greek and Latin, which he hopes to eventually teach at classical liberal arts schools. Andrew also volunteers at church for Vacation Bible School and Faith Train, which is a combination of VBS and Sunday school, held every Wednesday of the school year.



Andrew's essay was titled "The New Holocaust." He rightly compares the holocaust of Nazi Germany, when 12 million people were exterminated because they were believed to be "inferior" human beings, to the deaths of 63 million babies between the years 1973 and 2022 for the same reason. Well done, Andrew.

First Place: Allison (Ally) Packer, from Collinsville, Illinois, won first place at the national level in the 6-8 grade category. Allison won her award while in eighth grade at Good Shepherd Lutheran School in Collinsville, Illinois, and is a member at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. She has two older siblings and four younger siblings—two brothers and four sisters. Allison enjoys volleyball and track. When she is not playing sports or doing other extracurricular activities after school, she enjoys baking and writing.

At first, I didn't like it; I was young and selfish. Adding two new kids to my family was difficult. In 2020, my family fostered two beautiful girls, Athena and Roseanne. I was ten years old when we fostered, and they were only six and seven. There were times I'd complain about how they were overtaking my home. They didn't have the same rules or follow the same expectations; in my head, they were being let off easy. I didn't understand what my parents were actually doing. We already had a big family. What I came to realize was that they were planting a light in the darkness as God called them to do. John 1:4-5 states, "In him was life, and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." My parents truly valued life and wanted to give these girls a chance to see Jesus. This helped me understand that foster care fulfills Jesus' command to care for the fatherless.

We fostered for three and a half months. As time went on, I realized God's plan for these girls and why He placed them in my home. As my love for them grew, I realized what a blessing foster care is—not just for me but for these children as well. We provided a safe home and a chance for them to see Christ. This was something they never would've experienced if not for my parents



opening doors as God commanded: "You must love the foreigner as yourself" (Leviticus 19:33-34). By the end, foster care became one of the best things that ever happened to me.



Christ says in Isaiah 1:17, "Learn to do right! Seek justice, encourage the oppressed. Defend the cause of the fatherless, plead the case of the widow."

It states how important caring for orphans is to God. Foster care plays a part in fulfilling God's command and sparking a light for those who haven't had a chance to see God.

Finally, all lives are significant to God, even those of the fatherless. We're called to be a light in the darkness and care for orphans. Furthermore, foster care provides the opportunity to share God's Word with those who need it. It's a chance to spark light into the dark lives of these young children. It's a real blessing; all it takes is an open door.

Thank you, Ally, for the honesty and love that shine through in your essay. Sometimes we don't understand at first why things happen in our life, but as God promises, He showers us with blessing after blessing as we walk in His ways. What a wonderful gift to you that "[your] love for them grew," and what a wonderful lesson you have passed on to all of us!

Second Place: Leviathan Duley, Arlington, Nebraska, won second place at the national level in the 6-8 grade category. He was in the seventh grade at St. Paul's Lutheran School when he won his award. Leviathan is the oldest of five children born to Pastor Jason and Karis Duley. He is 13 years old and has lived most of his life in Arlington, NE. His siblings are sisters Naomi (11), Gemma (9), Hosanna (7), and brother Judah (3). Leviathan has always enjoyed athletics and plays soccer, basketball, and baseball. Several years ago, the Life Chapter added a rocking chair, a bassinet, a prayer shawl, and a small table holding a red rose beside their display of printed resources. It immediately attracted more people to their table for conversation and the chance to distribute their life-affirming materials. You might even consider expanding this great display idea with items such as a wheelchair, walker, cane, crutches, and an adult sized bib. Anything that aids the understanding that life issues occur from fertilization to forever would add to the deeper meaning of your display. A special thank you to our Wisconsin friends for sharing their idea and positive experience.



For many years, Lutherans For Life has produced Gospel-motivated, life-affirming resources to encourage you to celebrate a Sanctity of Life Sunday. Why do we do this? Why should you celebrate a Life Sunday? Because, of all that He has created, God values human lives above all else, and the world in which we live does not. The Body of Christ *must* be a voice For Life, or individuals will never know of their great value to the God who created them in His image.

In Psalm 139:14 we read: "I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; my soul knows it very well." And again, in Psalm 139:16: "Your eyes saw my unformed substance; in your book were written, every one of them, the days that were formed for me, when as yet there was none of them."

These verses from God's Word speak the truth about the value of every human being, yet there are those who do not believe this truth, and there are those who do believe but need to be strengthened and supported in that belief. That is why the Church needs to speak the truth.

Does your church have a set of life-sized fetal models? Consider purchasing a set to show all ages the wonder and beauty of the unborn child. Fetal models

may be purchased from Heritage House (www.pro.life). They are useful in children's sermons and

Sunday school lessons as well as on Life Sundays! Smaller sizes and various models are also available. The models do come on sale periodically if cost is an issue.

# **Celebrating Life Sunday**

Remember, Life Sunday may be observed on any Sunday of the year. However, many churches hold their Life Sunday in January, the month in which *Roe v. Wade* opened the door to unlimited abortion. In 2025, the official Life Sunday is scheduled for January 19, the beginning of Life Week. During Life Week, LFL conducts evening presentations all week long that are available to your entire congregation. This leads to the end

of the week when the youth head to Washington, D.C., to participate in the Y4Life conference that includes participating in the March for Life. After 50 years, some congregations have opted to hold their Life Sunday near June 24 when *Roe v. Wade* was overturned. The important thing is to observe Life Sunday! Being For Life is not all about abortion. It is about life at all phases and ages!

# Need More Ideas?

- Distribute white roses to members. White roses symbolize innocence and purity as well as a remembrance of those lost to abortion.
- Hold a coffee hour with plenty of goodies and be available to answer questions about your resources.
- Gift the altar flowers to someone in the congregation: the oldest mom or dad, the family with the most children, the oldest member of the congregation, the youngest member of the congregation, etc.
- Add brochures from your local pregnancy resource center(s) to your display table.
- Give away candy, precious feet pins, 10-week fetal models, etc. Heritage House '76 has tons of merchandise for special life events (www.pro.life).

Celebrating life with a Sanctity of Life Sunday will mean extra work and add some cost as well, but the world so desperately needs the Body of Christ to affirm this greatest of all gifts—life! By reminding people of the sanctity of life, we also remind them how valuable that life is. Our Lord Jesus gave His life to give us life everlasting. The two are inseparable. Jesus said, "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly" (John 10:10).



# Walking with Jesus



The Christian life is sometimes described as "walking with the Lord." That's a good description since Jesus called Himself the Way or Path. In John 14:6, He invites us to follow Him and promises to walk with us.

Besides, walking is something we do daily—something unspectacular but necessary. And Christian living is like that. Not just for Sundays but for every day our whole lives through. Not something "splashy" or sensational. Not looking for attention but giving glory to God. A daily continuing in the way that Jesus directs us. His way, not ours.

# Like a Water Tower

I wrote my column for this issue just after attending Concordia Lutheran Theological Seminary's Vicars Dinner, which was sponsored by the Lutheran Women's Missionary League – Canada (LWMLC). It brought back memories from years ago when I attended as a student preparing to head out on my vicarage. It was an enjoyable evening. LWMLC President Linda Long gave a wonderful presentation on all that the LWMLC does to support the work of the ministry. It was a good refresher for me as well as for the vicars.

During the event, I encouraged each of the vicars to think of himself as a water tower. Water towers are filled over time with life-sustaining water. Then they distribute that water slowly to those in need. They do not dump all they have all at once; if they do, it overwhelms.

Vicars are heading out to put into practice what they have been filled with over their training. They will also take more in as they learn under the tutelage of a seasoned pastor. The danger is they might be like a teenager who is taking driver's education, sitting in the back seat and constantly telling Mom or Dad what is wrong with their driving. I cautioned the vicars against that way of serving.





When I was a student, Dean Humann told us in preaching class that we are to preach the whole council of God—but, he said, we don't have to do it in full in every sermon. To do that would be like a water tower dumping all its water at once, overwhelming those intended to be helped. We need to discern not only what people need to hear but when best they ought to hear it.



The Holy Spirit continues to fill us through Word and Sacrament, sustaining our faith and preparing us for everlasting life in our Father's Kingdom.

This counsel does not just apply to pastors. Over my years in ministry, I have met many well-meaning energetic Christians. Unfortunately, some have tried the "hit 'em over the head with the Bible and drag them to church" approach.

That approach usually ends with the person feeling overwhelmed and running for an exit. As the people of God, we have been filled with the life-giving news of Christ. The Holy Spirit continues to fill us through Word and Sacrament, sustaining our faith and preparing us for everlasting life in our Father's Kingdom.

We are thus moved by that Spirit to tell everyone what He has done. We go about our daily lives and vocations sharing that with which we have been filled. But we do so with gentleness and respect. We do so with great patience and careful instruction. The danger is that, if we dump everything all at once on others, we will overwhelm them.


Another danger is forgetting that it is the Lord's work. If we start to think everything depends on us, then we forget who really brings people to faith: God. Our task is to speak His Word and then let God be God. He determines where, when, and how that Word works. Don't fall for Satan's Garden of Eden lies—that you will be like God. It is ultimately all God's work.

This knowledge is, in fact, very calming. If it depends on me, then all is lost. Thankfully it depends on God. It is His work. We are blessed that He has worked saving faith in us. And by the power of the Holy Spirit, He empowers and uses us in His service where and when He chooses. Thanks be to God.

After Our Savior Lutheran Church in Grand Rapids participated in the bus stop shelter project, a closer relationship has been developed with the pregnancy resource center.


Under the direction of Life Team leader Carla Niemeier, diapers, baby clothing, and other items are being collected year around instead of only between Mother's Day and Father's Day.



# Owen's Mission





# The Basics of Lutherans For Life

**Our Mission:** Equipping Lutherans and their neighbors to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life **Our Vision:** Every Lutheran congregation upholding the God-given value of human life and influencing society to do the same

#### Structure and Relationships

A local Life Chapter is a local organization that has been chartered by National Lutherans For Life. The Life Chapter is formally associated with and subject to, but not a part of, the corporation known as Lutherans For Life, Inc.

A Life Team is a group of dedicated church members forming a For Life group within one congregation to serve under the auspices of the local congregation.

A Life Advocate is an individual working to support the church's pastor in keeping the flow of educational information in front of the congregation on a regular basis. Life Teams and Life Advocates do not qualify for the remittance program.

A State Federation is an organization that has been chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc., in a state where there are at least five chartered Life Chapters. In a state where a State Federation exists, the Life Chapters also become affiliated with the State Federation. This occurs automatically at the same time a Life Chapter becomes chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc. These relationships are basically the same whether or not the Life Chapter is incorporated. Thus, Lutherans For Life consists of a network of individual entities formally associated with each other.

#### Membership Information

All officers of State Federations and Life Chapters and Life Advocates must be members in good standing of Lutheran congregations and members of National Lutherans For Life. Membership contributions are divided among the national organization, State Federation, and local Life Chapter if it is chartered.

Life Chapters that wish to include a membership form in newsletters or correspondence are asked to maintain the form and information provided by the national office. The local Life Chapter may not establish its own membership program since LFL has a "unified membership" program. When sending a membership form to the national office, make sure the Life Chapter name and number, if chartered, is written on the form in the space provided. This will ensure that the State Federation and local Life Chapter receive the proper remittance payment.

#### Membership Classifications

#### Annual Membership

 Annual members join by making a membership donation accompanied by a completed copy of the membership form (or by joining online).

#### Sponsor Membership

- Sponsor members pledge to contribute a certain amount each month and to pray regularly for Lutherans For Life.
- Sponsor members receive a monthly letter from the executive director.
- Sponsor members are asked to renew their monthly pledge each year as part of the annual membership drive.

#### The Remittance Program of LFL

All MEMBERSHIP donations are shared with the chartered State Federation and/or local Life Chapter to which the particular members may belong. The membership donations are divided as follows:

#### Annual Memberships:

- 20% goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 20% goes to the State Federation.)
- 20% goes to the State Federation
- 60% remains at national

#### Sponsor Memberships:

- 1/12 goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 1/12 goes to the State Federation.)
- 1/12 goes to the State Federation
- 10/12 remains at national
