

# A Bible Study: Deuteronomy

The book of Deuteronomy was written at the end of Israel's 40 years of wandering in the wilderness. This also places the book at the end of Moses' life and right before God led the new generation of Israelites into the Promised Land. You might think of this book as Moses' farewell speech to God's people. Before he died, Moses reminded the Israelites of the covenant that He made with them when He first brought them out of the Land of Egypt, 40 years earlier. Therefore, much of what we read in Deuteronomy is a repeat of what God reveals to us in the book of Leviticus. In fact, the name "Deuteronomy" comes from two Greek words which mean "second law."

We should not be surprised to find that many of the same sanctity of life themes from the book of Leviticus are found in Deuteronomy as well. We hear about atoning sacrifices, being clean and unclean, and civil laws on how the people of Israel were to care for their neighbors. This book also contains some things that might be difficult for us to accept, like the severe punishments that God prescribes for those who disobey some of these regulations. Yet even these more difficult passages teach us valuable lessons about how highly God values human life. As always, please speak with your pastor if you have questions about the more difficult concepts contained in this book.

Deuteronomy begins with a summary of the past 40 years, including a summary of several of the battles that Israel has just endured (chapters 1-3). In these chapters we are reminded of how God guards, defends, and protects His people. While some of this can be hard for us to understand, what does it teach us about who has the authority to take life? Being a Gospel-motivated voice For Life sometimes means facing opposition. Do these chapters teach us that we can commit violence on those who oppose the Gospel? (See also Deuteronomy 32:35 and Romans 12:19.)

Chapter 1 also includes instruction for the setting up of judges and the provision of justice (1:15-18). According to Moses, what is the purpose of a judge? What does righteous judgment look like? How can this inform us about the proper role of the government in our own day, especially regarding their role in defending life (compared with 1 Peter 2:13-14)?

Moses repeats the 10 Commandments in chapter 5. Toward the end of the book, God said that the regulations He gave to Israel were "life and good" (Deuteronomy 30:15). We know that we are not saved by the Law (Ephesians 2:8-9), so for what purpose(s) does God give these laws to His people? Does God still intend us to keep these 10 Commandments? How does this reveal God's love for the lives and well-being of those He created?

How does God describe the land that He is bringing them in to possess (6:3, 8:7-10)? We often focus on spiritual things in the Church. Is God also concerned with our bodily needs (see also 24:19-22)? In what ways does this direct the way we deal with our neighbors?



God gives many promises throughout the book of Deuteronomy, but He also issues some severe warnings. There are even occasions when God commands capital punishment. For what reason(s) does God command this to be done? What distinctions are made between intentional and unintentional homicide (see chapter 19)? How can capital punishment coexist with, or even underscore, the sanctity of life? While the Bible does allow for the practice of capital punishment, why might some Christians have legitimate concerns about its use?



In chapter 10, God gives direction regarding the treatment of widows, orphans, and sojourners. He also speaks about the treatment of the poor in chapter 15. How does the Lord treat these marginalized people, and how does He expect Israel to treat them? How can we apply that to the life issues that we face today?

At the end of chapter 15, the Lord also gives some direction regarding the treatment of slaves. Is God condoning slavery or preventing its abuse? How can these instructions reinforce our understanding of the sanctity of every human life?

There is a prohibition against the killing of children at the beginning of chapter 18. In what context is this prohibition given? What is the common thread between all these "abominable practices" (Deuteronomy 18:9)? How might that inform our understanding of the practice of abortion and other means of destroying human life?

The Lord makes provisions for the rights of the firstborn in chapter 21. Does the manner or circumstances of a person's birth affect their value before the Lord? How does He show His love and concern for the lives of all the children of Israel?

Toward the end of Deuteronomy, God promises to send a new prophet like Moses to His people, (18:15). Who is that greater Prophet that God sends to speak His Word? How does that Prophet address the sanctity of life in His ministry? What does He do that endows all human life with even greater value before God?



# Redeeming Grace Retreat: A Lutheran Response to Abortion Recovery



In a groundbreaking initiative, **Word of Hope**, a ministry of Lutherans For Life, in partnership with Lutheran Family Service of Iowa, is launching the first **Redeeming Grace** retreat—a uniquely Lutheran, Scripture-centered program offering healing for women suffering from post-abortion grief, while also training professionals to guide future retreats grounded in the Gospel.

# Addressing a Silent Crisis

Abortion is often presented as a solution to an unexpected pregnancy—one that promises freedom and a return to normalcy. Yet for many women, the emotional and spiritual consequences linger. While abortion may remove the responsibilities of parenting, it does not erase the reality of a life created nor the grief that often follows.

Pregnancy doesn't break women—but abortion often breaks hearts.

# The Church Cannot Stay Silent

Research from Lifeway reveals that seven in ten women who have had abortions identify as Christian, and 43% were attending church regularly at the time of their abortion. The Guttmacher Institute reports that in 2020, over 158,000 women who had abortions identified as mainline Protestants, including Lutherans. Meanwhile, Pew Research shows 46% of LCMS Lutherans believe abortion should be legal in all or most cases.

These numbers make it clear: In every congregation, there are women who have experienced or are considering abortion—and many are silently suffering.

# The Weight of Shame, the Need for Grace

Many post-abortive women, particularly those in the Church, fear their sin is too great for forgiveness. Lifeway data shows that nearly half were never told by their pastors that Christ's forgiveness includes forgiveness for the sin of abortion. Over half keep their abortion a secret, isolating themselves from the very community that could offer grace.

And even women who attend secular recovery programs often leave with lingering spiritual guilt, without the healing that only confession, absolution, and the Gospel can bring.





# Redeeming Grace: A Christ-Centered Path to Healing

That's what makes **Redeeming Grace** such a vital and distinct ministry. Rooted in Lutheran doctrine and Scripture, it walks women through a Gospel-based process of confession, forgiveness, and restoration—affirming the sanctity of life and the boundless mercy of Christ.

The first Redeeming Grace retreat will take place November 13–16, 2025, at Wildwoods Ranch in St. Charles, Iowa. Staff and trainees will arrive one day early for prayer, team building, and setup. Participants will be welcomed Thursday afternoon, with shuttle service available from the airport. Each woman will receive a thoughtful gift basket including a Bible, journal, writing supplies, and self-care items to support her throughout the weekend.

# A Transformative Experience

Across six structured sessions—Recognize, Respect, Relate, Release, Reconcile, and Restore—participants will engage in holistic faith-based experiences designed to promote emotional healing and spiritual renewal:

- Liturgical Worship: Christ-centered worship nourishes the soul with Word and prayer.
- Educational Workshops: Learn about the emotional, biological, and spiritual consequences of abortion.
- **Bible Study**: Encounter God's truth and rediscover your identity in Christ through the Scriptures.
- **Journaling & Group Discussions**: Safely reflect and share in fellowship with others on a similar path.
- Art Therapy: Use creative expression to process grief and honor the life that was lost.
- Outdoor Activities: Hiking, equestrian experiences, and campfires help foster peace and vulnerability.
- **Poem of Lament**: Give voice to grief in a sacred and creative way.
- **Mindfulness Exercises**: Learn to be present with God and His creation, cultivating peace and gratitude.
- Confession & Absolution: Experience the healing power of Christ's forgiveness in a deeply personal way.
- Ongoing Support: Connect with Word of Hope for spiritual care and resources beyond the retreat.

# Why This Retreat Matters

- Fellowship is essential for healing. Abortion often leads to shame and isolation. Redeeming Grace creates a compassionate, Christ-centered community where women are no longer alone in their grief.
- **Healing is multidimensional.** Through Scripture, worship, time in nature, art, personal reflection, and open conversation, women are given space to grieve, process, and begin to heal—body, mind, and soul.



As the retreat concludes, participants will depart with renewed hope, stronger faith, and practical tools for continued healing. Follow-up check-ins at six weeks and six months will help assess growth, offer encouragement, and support long-term recovery. Those trained as leaders will also reconnect at six months to explore launching Redeeming Grace retreats in their own communities.

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

# An LFL Staff Profile: Barbara Lane Geistfeld, D.V.M.



Barbara Lane Geistfeld, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine, also known as "Barb," began her work at Lutherans For Life on July 1, 2015, as the Regional Director of Texas. She traveled to Lutheran churches and schools giving presentations, displaying LFL resources, and gifting over twenty sets of fetal models to schools. She attended LWML rallies, pastors' conferences, and other Lutheran church gatherings, always as a Gospel-motivated voice For Life. As the structure changed at LFL, she became an Assistant Director of Volunteer Relations and is now a Volunteer Relations Associate serving the Frontline via email, phone, and writing for *LifeDate* and *Directions*.

Barb comes from Grand Rapids, Minnesota, 100 miles south of the Canadian border. Her dad, Robert, was a marine who served in the South Pacific during WWII. He attended Dunwoody Technical College and became a master machinist. He worked in the iron ore mines and then attended college so he could teach high school machine shop. Her mom, Lois, was an at-home mom who enrolled in the local community college when Barb did and then earned her Bachelor of Science from Bemidji State. Barb was very proud of her parents as they were the only ones of their seventeen siblings to get a college degree. Barb has one younger brother, Ron. They grew up on the shores of Prairie Lake, spending summer days fishing, hiking in the woods, climbing trees, playing softball, and swatting mosquitoes. Winter hours were filled with sledding, skating, ice fishing, and melting ice chunks off mittens and boots. Does she miss minus 40- to minus 60-degree windchills? *No.* Does she miss mosquitoes? *Never*.

Barb entered the U of M College of Veterinary Medicine in 1969 after two years of junior college. There was a handsome young man in her class, Jim Geistfeld, who caught her eye (and vice versa). Barb was raised in the First Church of God, Anderson, Indiana, and her faith was important to her. Jim was a Missouri Synod Lutheran, about which she knew nothing, and he, too, was sincere about his love for Jesus. They married in July of 1972 between their junior and senior year and recently celebrated their 53<sup>rd</sup> wedding anniversary. Being married to her best friend for more than half a century, and serving the Lord together in the Lutheran church, has been an incredible blessing. Luther's revelation became her revelation and changed her life: "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast" (Ephesians 2: 8-9).

After graduation, the Geistfelds lived in a variety of places. Matthew James was born in 1977, and exactly two years later,

almost to the minute, Erin Michal was born. Barb worked part-time for other veterinarians until her children were three and one and then started seeing private clients in her home. Every time Jim started a new position, she took her equipment and set up a new practice in her home. For twenty-eight years she raised her children and practiced her beloved profession at the same time. What a privilege!



Barb and Jim were bitten by the travel bug early in life. On their own, as well as with Heifer International, Lutheran World Relief, and other venues, they have traveled to every continent and visited all fifty states. They have seen incredible sights and met wonderful people who have enriched their lives. They often took Bibles with them in the language of the people they visited and believe they have enriched the lives of others as well. Travel now includes trips to upstate New York and Maryland to visit their children and four granddaughters: Ava and Brooke (Matt's) and Ella and Hannah (Erin's), ages 12, 10, 7 and 5.



Barb and Jim retired in 2008 to their beloved hill country of Texas. Settled by the Germans in the mid-1800s, it is full of great German cooking, confessional Lutheran churches, Tex-Mex, barbequed brisket, and best of all, people who can correctly pronounce "Geistfeld" on their first try.

Barb's greatest loves are traveling and birdwatching. She has thousands of birds on her Life List. She also loves to read, cook, bake, and sew for her four granddaughters. In the summer she puts up the produce that Jim brings in from his garden.



Barb never envisioned being a part of Lutherans For Life until God called her out of "retirement." Pastor Michael Salemink, LFL's most recent Executive Director, once said to her, "We would never have intentionally looked for a veterinarian for our staff, but you have been a tremendous blessing to our ministry." She will hold this affirmation deep in her heart as she retires from LFL on October 31, 2025. It has been a wonderfully enriching ten years, and she will continue to be a voice For Life wherever the Lord leads her. Her plans are to write two books, travel, watch her grandchildren grow up, and aim for her 70th wedding anniversary. Let's see what the Lord says about all that!







# Life Project: Christmas Luncheon and Goody Bags for Older Adults



This project has been shared by the Good Shepherd Lutheran Life Team in Collinsville, Illinois. Thank you to Lynn Cook, Life Team Leader, for her helpful information.

"And the angel said to them, 'Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger" (Luke 2:10-13).

Christmas is a time to celebrate Jesus' birth and be with family and friends. Unfortunately, not everyone is able to attend Christmas events with their loved ones. The Christmas Luncheon was started many years ago by a pastor's wife at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Collinsville, Illinois. As she became an older adult, the Good Shepherd Lutheran Life Team saw the importance in continuing the event and started hosting it.

The Life Team starts their planning early in the year by picking the theme. This theme flows through the entire event. By their July meeting, the Life Team knows who will help with the various tasks, and all tasks are assigned by November.

Volunteers are essential in making this event successful. Volunteers decorate, cook, clean, and possibly provide rides as needed. They are scheduled in shifts and are given specific tasks to complete. This ensures the event runs smoothly and on time without a few people being burdened with many tasks. For Good Shepherd Lutheran's luncheon, they have 15-20 volunteers and an average attendance of 75 older adults who attend. It is a wonderful opportunity for the younger members in the congregation to cook, serve, and clean up. Lynn Cook always sends a personal thank you note to all the volunteers. She wants them to feel that their work and service to others has not gone unnoticed.



Good Shepherd Lutheran Church is blessed with two volunteers who love decorating and take on the task every year. While some of the decorations have been elaborate, many luncheons were simply decorated with Christmas decorations found at any local store. Christmas trees, red and green decorations, snowflakes, angels, and items that fit the theme are some possibilities. Poinsettias are used and given away at the end of the event. Your church or group may even have decorations ready for use. The tables also have a favor at each seat for the attendees. These are typically Christmas cookies but can vary depending on the theme for the event.

The event is held on a Friday in early December. It starts at 11:00 a.m. with punch. The pastor leads the group in devotion before and after the activities. The meal is served at 11:30 a.m. and there is a short



presentation that fits the theme. The school's music director is invited to bring a couple of grades to perform. The festivities always end with singing Christmas carols. The luncheon concludes around 1:00 p.m.

The group enjoys having a different menu every year. Here are some menu examples:

- Hashbrown casserole, Italian beef and bread, peppermint ice cream, and cookies
- Lasagna, Italian salad, Italian bread, and cherry dessert
- Ham and sweet potatoes, green Jello, and desserts
- Chicken breast, potatoes, cranberries, and eclairs
- Chicken tetrazzini, green beans, cranberries, and eclairs

Advertising for the luncheon begins in early November. The Life Team puts out a sign-up sheet to ensure they know how many to prepare for. The meal is funded with a \$250 Thrivent Action Team Grant. To describe this project when applying to receive a grant, you could refer to it as a Senior Recognition Christmas Luncheon.

"The most important thing is getting the people together," said Lynn Cook, as encouragement for others that a simple event will be just as welcomed and enjoyed as an elaborate luncheon with magnificent decorations.

# Christmas Goody Bags

Along with the meal for older adults, the Life Team assembles Christmas goody bags to bless homebound members. The bags remind these members that they are cared for and loved during the Christmas season.

Christmas gift bags may be used, but the Life Team found they can be pricey. Plain brown gift bags are used, which are decorated by the school's third-grade class. The bags are given to the teacher in October to provide plenty of time for planning and decorating by the students.



This project is also funded by a \$250 Thrivent Action Team Grant. If you decide to apply for a grant, referring to the project as a Senior Christmas Gift Bag project would be a helpful description. Standard items that Good Shepherd Lutheran Life Team puts in the bags are stationery and pre-stamped envelopes, cookies made by a lady from the congregation, a devotional, and footie slippers (including a pair for husband and wife, if the bag goes to a couple). One year a member donated homemade lap robes for each bag. Another year devotional books from Concordia Publishing House and reading magnifiers were purchased. Candy and other snacks may be added.

It typically takes the Life Team an hour to put 25 bags together. Each bag is labeled with the name and address of the recipient. They are then placed on a table in the Narthex for congregation members to deliver to the homebound person on the label. The Life Team also puts together two to three bags without names that can be given to a member's neighbor or friend in need of a pick me up.



# 2025 LFL National Essay Contest

The annual Lutherans For Life Essay Contest, sponsored by the Council of Federation Presidents (COFP), continues to offer our Lutheran students the opportunity to affirm and express their belief in the sanctity of life. The theme this year was "Fearfully and Wonderfully Made," based on the Bible verse "For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; my soul knows it very well" (Psalm 139:13-14).

The national essay contest is offered to students in two categories: grades 6-8 and grades 9-12. Students in both Federation states and Non-Federation states are eligible to participate. After each state has submitted their first-place winner, a national committee selects a national first-place and second-place winner in each category. Any student in a Lutheran school or Lutheran congregation (e.g., confirmation class, youth group, or Lutheran home school) is eligible to participate when validated by their teacher or pastor, along with parental consent. All state winners should be commended on winning at their state level as the number of submitted essays increases every year. The national first-place award in both categories is \$500, a framed certificate, free LFL conference registration for both the student and parents, a one-night hotel stay for the conference, and \$200 for travel expenses. The second-place award for both categories is \$250 and a framed certificate. Information about the 2025 Essay Contest can be found on the Lutherans For Life website.





# Owen's Mission



We want students to understand the God-given value of each life from the moment of conception. We want students to be motivated by what God has done as our Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier that gives value to life. We want students to value themselves and to value others as persons because of this God-given value.



"I held my little grandson Owen in the palm of my hand. He died at 21 weeks during prenatal surgery to remove a large tumor. The nurse brought him to our son as we waited in the recovery room for Owen's mother. I find it difficult to describe what I felt when I was able to hold him. I had held the 20-week *Touch of Life* fetal model in my hands hundreds of times in front of students from preschoolers to seminarians. Holding Owen revived in me the reality behind those models. I will never hold them in the same way again."





# The Basics of Lutherans For Life

Our Mission: Equipping Lutherans and their neighbors to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life



**Our Vision:** Every Lutheran congregation upholding the God-given value of human life and influencing society to do the same

## Structure and Relationships

A local Life Chapter is a local organization that has been chartered by National Lutherans For Life. The Life Chapter is formally associated with and subject to, but not a part of, the corporation known as Lutherans For Life, Inc.

A Life Team is a group of dedicated church members forming a For Life group within one congregation to serve under the auspices of the local congregation.

A Life Advocate is an individual working to support the church's pastor in keeping the flow of educational information in front of the congregation on a regular basis. Life Teams and Life Advocates do not qualify for the remittance program.

A State Federation is an organization that has been chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc., in a state where there are at least five chartered Life Chapters. In a state where a State Federation exists, the Life Chapters also become affiliated with the State Federation. This occurs automatically at the same time a Life Chapter becomes chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc. These relationships are basically the same whether or not the Life Chapter is incorporated. Thus, Lutherans For Life consists of a network of individual entities formally associated with each other.

## Membership Information

All officers of State Federations and Life Chapters and Life Advocates must be members in good standing of Lutheran congregations and members of National Lutherans For Life. Membership contributions are divided among the national organization, State Federation, and local Life Chapter if it is chartered.

Life Chapters that wish to include a membership form in newsletters or correspondence are asked to maintain the form and information provided by the national office. The local Life Chapter may not establish its own membership program since LFL has a "unified membership" program. When sending a membership form to the national office, make sure the Life Chapter name and number, if chartered, is written on the form in the space provided. This will ensure that the State Federation and local Life Chapter receive the proper remittance payment.

## Membership Classifications

## Annual Membership

• Annual members join by making a membership donation accompanied by a completed copy of the membership form (or by joining online).

## Sponsor Membership

- Sponsor members pledge to contribute a certain amount each month and to pray regularly for Lutherans For Life.
- Sponsor members receive a monthly letter from the executive director.
- Sponsor members are asked to renew their monthly pledge each year as part of the annual membership drive.

# The Remittance Program of LFL

All MEMBERSHIP donations are shared with the chartered State Federation and/or local Life Chapter to which the particular members may belong. The membership donations are divided as follows:

## Annual Memberships:

- 20% goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 20% goes to the State Federation.)
- 20% goes to the State Federation
- 60% remains at national

# Sponsor Memberships:

- 1/12 goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 1/12 goes to the State Federation.)
- 1/12 goes to the State Federation
- 10/12 remains at national

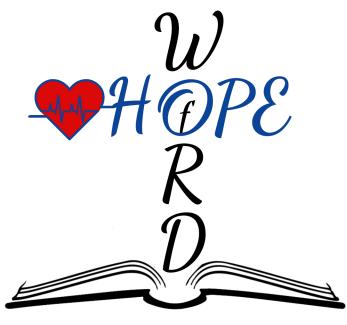

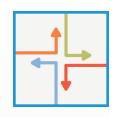
