Can God Use My Hurt for My Good by Rev. Todd Peperkorn



"My heart and my flesh fail me, but God is the rock of my heart and my portion forever" (Psalm 73:26).

It is hard to imagine that God does good things through bad things. Bad things are, well, bad. God, be my rock and my salvation. Surround me with people who love me and embrace me with Your steadfast love. Help me to see that my heart does not need to be alone.
